Tennant, out of the proceeds of a Valley Railway Contract. This money was paid by Tennant to George B. Jones, M. P. P. and by the latter to Mr. Daggett who remitted it through Bank of Montreal, Fredericton to Ar, Sumner under the name of "Wiliam Tompson". The evidence of Mr. Jones at the enquiry is quoted and contrasted with evidence which he gave at the time of the Stevens enquiry. In one case he swore that he had received but \$20,000 from Tennant, but to Commissioner McQueer he admitted the amount as \$61,500. Tennant's Activities

The Commissioner deals at some ength with the evidence of Mr. W. B. Fennant, particularly with his statement that he had declared to several persons that the \$61,500 he had paid Jones would have to be restored to his business before he would go on he stand and testify at the Stevens enquiry. It was brought out in evidence that part of the money was subsequent ly loaned him by ex-Atorney Baxter and he was thus placed in a position to go on the stand and transfully declare that the \$61,500 was then in his busi ness. Says the Commissioner.

"With this array of facts before me I am asked to believe Mr. Tennant's tatements in this regard. "absolutely absurd" on the ground, as the ex-Attorney General states, that no "rea ny standpoint in order to get Tennant o give testimony". If I had only the facts which support ontention? I must also conclude that a reasonable man, as a business proposition would loan \$40,000 and \$20,000 without any security being taken, without any time limit as to its payment; without any understanding as to the payment of interest and without any demand being made for the return of \$40,000 of this loan or any part of it since the 18th day of June 1917 to the date the evidence was given and that the loan being made on the day previous to the sitting of the enquiry at which Tennant's books were to be examined, was simply a coincidence.
