THE PEACE TREATY LIKELY TO BE CONCLUDED BY EASTER

An Optimistic Feeling Now Prevails at the Conference—The First Payment by the Huns will be Twenty-five Million Francs—Will be Divided Between Begium and France—Many Debatable Points Compromised.

Paris, April 6—The confident statement of Premier Lloyd George that the peace treaty will be concluded by Easter is supported by predictions repeatedly made by less prominent members of the peace conference and dispelled today much of the hopelessness and uncertainty in which many important problems at the conference seemed to have been enshrouded.

Even the announcements of serious Bolshevik troubles in Bavaria and the danger of a break with Italy over the Adriatic problem apparently did not affect the optimism today of the leaders of the British, French, and American delegations.

Decide This Week

Paris, April 5—At the conference of today's meeting of the council of four it was stated that reparations had been considered all day without final result but that the progress made was such as to warrant the prospect that an agreement would be reached by next Sunday on all the remaining questions including the Rhine frontier, the Saare Valley and reparations. The following week will be devoted to drafting the final text of the treaty.

A plenary session has been decided upon for the coming week for the consideration of labor questions.

Details of Reparation

Paris, April 6—The council of four on Saturday reached an agreement on the principles on the indemnities and reparations to be paid by Germany and examination of the details will begin immediately, the newspapers say. It is not believed there will be any disagreement as to details, and it is indicated that the text of the financial terms will be finished during the week.

The Echo de Paris says that compromises were effected on all debatable points regarding the sum to be paid at once by Germany and the payments in the future. Against the opposition of the French government, it was agreed the paper says to distribute the future payments over a term of thirty years. The payments for the next few years were fixed.

The Journal says there are indications that the rights of France and Belgium to prior consideration in the payments by Germany have been recognized. The first German payment, it

says, will be 25,000,000,000 francs of which five billion goes to pay for raw materials to insure the resumption of German economic life. France will get ten billion francs and Belgium five billion of the first payment. The rest of the indemnity, the paper says, will run over a period of thirty-five years.

Plans for continued occupation of the left bank of the Rhine have been abandoned and the Allies will depend upon an economic blockade as the means of pressure on Germany. Final agreement on the Rhine and Saare valley questions will be reached before the end of the week, it is added. Increased optimism in diplomatic circles is noted by the press, while in editorials the newspapers express satisfaction over the progress made over the reparation and indemnity. It is pointed out that each day of delay in reaching a final agreement adds to the losses of France.

The favorable solution of the Danzig question is commented upon in complimentary terms. The moral and political advantages of the agreement are emphasized by the papers.

Agreement Regarding Polish Troops
Copenhagen, April 5—A German version of the agreement reached at Spa regarding the transport of General Haller's Polish troops says that Marshal Foch promised to recommend that the British give freedom to German coastal shipping for the duration of the passage of Polish troops through German territory.

After giving the various routes to be taken, the despatch says that the Germans guarantee the complete safety of these routes. On the other hand measures have been taken that the troops being transported do nothing that might cause a disturbance among the population.

Late Jeanette M. Young

The deceased was eighteen years of age and is survived by her step-parents Mr. and Mrs. William Lynch, two sisters Mrs. Harry Lynch and Miss Christina Young, by one half-sister Gertrude, and by two half-brothers Harry and William. The funeral took place this afternoon at 2.30 o'clock, interment being made at the Rural Cemetery. Rev. A. D. McLeod assisted by Adjutant Miller conducted the service.

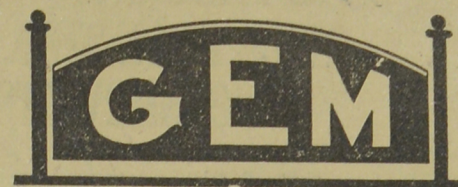
