

## TWO DECREES OF DIVORCE ARE TO ISSUE

CASES FINALLY DISPOSED  
OF HERE THIS MORNING

His Honor Judge Crocket this morning in the New Brunswick Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes ordered decrees of divorce to issue in two cases which came over from the preceding sitting of the court.

One case was that of Joseph Seymour Moore vs. May Hattie Moore in which the plaintiff is a returned soldier residing in St. John. In this case there was a question of condonation of the offenses committed by the defendant during the absence of the plaintiff overseas but it was proven that while the plaintiff was in hospital at St. John as the result of wounds, the defendant went to Halifax and Sydney with one Capt. Joseph A. Raymond and lived with him as his wife.

The other case is that Annie Gertrude Burton vs. James Burton, the plaintiff residing in St. John and the defendant in Hannibal, Mo. In this case corroborative evidence of infidelity on the part of the defendant at the Ottawa Hotel, St. John, was required but it was shown that the register of the hotel had been destroyed and that the man who had been manager of the hotel at the time had died.

Sergt. G. C. Machum

Sergt. G. C. Machum of North Devon is a son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Machum. He enlisted with the Composite Battalion at Halifax in August 1915. He went overseas in the spring of 1916 as a sergeant in the machine gun section of the 64th Battalion and has seen much service in France. He was wounded with shrapnel and just three days before the armistice was signed was gassed. He is expected home this evening.

Gunner J. B. Edgecombe

Gunner J. B. Edgecombe is a son of Mrs. A. W. Edgecombe of this city. He enlisted with the 9th Siege Battery and went overseas with a draft of that battery in 1917. Gnr. Edgecombe went to France with the 8th Brigade receiving his baptism of fire at Passchendaele. He came through the various engagements without receiving a wound. He arrived at Halifax on board the Northland and is expected in this city tomorrow evening.

Sapper Chester Tracey

Sapper Chester Tracey is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Tracey of Fredericton Junction. He went overseas with a Construction Corps in 1915. He has seen much service and came through it all without a scratch.

Gunner J. H. McQuarrie

Gunner J. H. McQuarrie of Perth is another of the returned boys who landed at Halifax. He enlisted and went overseas in 1917 with a draft of the 9th Siege Battery but was transferred to the Field Artillery with which he saw considerable service in France.

## METHODISTS PREPARING FOR RENOVATION

COMMITTEE TO CANVASS  
FOR THE FUNDS REQUIRED

Will Start Work When \$15,-  
000 Has Been Subscribed  
—Much Has Been Al-  
ready Pledged.

The trustees of the Fredericton Methodist Church held a special meeting on Wednesday of last week to receive a report from the Congregational Committee. A resolution was passed appointing five members on a building committee to proceed with the renovation of the church as soon as a sum amounting to \$15,000 had been subscribed to the fund. About \$11,700 has so far been subscribed for the work, mostly in large amounts. The committee is at work organizing and a thorough canvass of the members of the congregation will be made to get the additional amounts required. It is estimated that the work of renovation will cost \$25,000 or \$30,000, but if the required amount of the estimate cannot be obtained the work of renovation will be curtailed.

Committee Appointed

At a later meeting the five members of the building committee were appointed, three from the Trustee Board and two from the congregation. The committee is as follows: J. M. Lemont Chairman, Col. W. J. Osborne, Secretary and J. J. Weddall from the Trustee Board; Charles K. Palmer and Fred B. Edgecombe from the Congregation.

To Restart Union Point Pulpmill

The Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company has issued notice to its employees at St. John that the company's pulpmill at Union Point, Fairville, will resume operations April 14th. This company has been promoting legislation for concessions for a pulpmill at Marysville, a dam across the Nashwaak River at that point and a water supply from Heron Lake for the western part of the town. The expectations was that a new mill would be erected at Marysville following the closing of the Union Point mill. The situation at the latter mill was complicated by a strike which has continued for some months. The notice to employees states that April 9th is the last date on which old employees in the Union Point mill can register to get back their former employment.

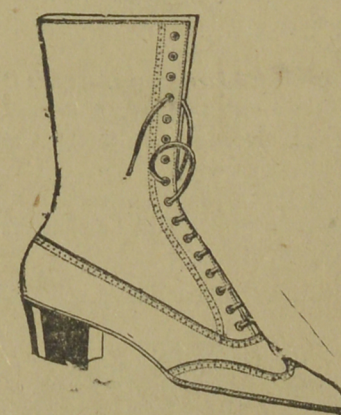
