## PAID ELOQUENT TRIBUTE TO LATE SIR WILFRID LAURIER

The Close of a Great Career, Marked by an Im-  
pressive Tribute—Thousands in Attendance  
at the Obsequies at Ottawa—Eulogies Pro-  
nounced by Archbishop Mathieu and Rev. Fr.  
Bourke—Although Dead, Sir Wilfrid's Soul  
Liveth in a Better World.

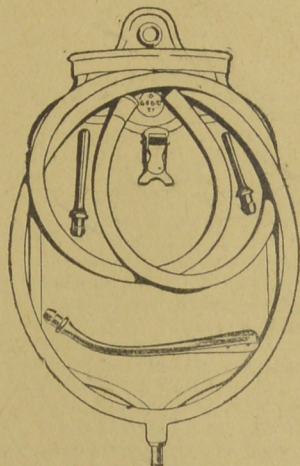
Ottawa, Feb. 23—Canada has today borne her illustrious dead with sorrow to the grave. The passing on Saturday of an era in Canadian political history the close of a great career was marked by the nation's tribute, impressive, reverent, befitting in every respect the mighty dead. The thronged streets were black with silent people through which the funeral corteges passed from the House of Parliament to the Basilica and thence to the last resting place beneath the flower covered sod of Notre Dame cemetery. The mile-long procession of representatives of crown, church, state, party and people, all races and creeds, in all walks and conditions of life, the eight great wagon loads of floral tributes a multitude of friends gathered to the capital from every province in the dominion to pay a parting witness of respect and regret a solemn and beautiful funeral service in a great church with all appeal of solemn music beautifully rendered, eloquent and feeling eulogies in French and English from Archbishop Mathieu and Rev. Father Burke, and no word from all the people but of praise for his character and service and of regret for his passing, all these marked the lauded funeral of Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Canada has buried the mortal remains of her most illustrious son with every possible and appropriate tribute of affection and admiration. There was no military display and no muffled drums but the hearts of the people beat funeral marches to his grave.

Sir Wilfrid passed into history with a triumphal procession more impressive than any which marked his political achievements and victories. The last spoken tribute that from Rev. Father Burke, closed the funeral service with the following feeling words which found an echo in every heart: "To you distinguished sons of Canada who have been honored by being chosen pall-bearers for Sir Wilfrid may I say bear him away gently, oh so gently. He is the nation's beloved. When you have arrived at the grave, lay him down tenderly into the resting place, for the kindly sod seldom covered a nobler heart than that which beat in Sir Wilfrid Laurier."

Promptly at ten o'clock the arrangements for the departure of the cortege were complete, despite the difficulty of having to make up a procession composed of horse-drawn sleighs (for the streets in Ottawa are deep in snow), and of scores of dignitaries of state, national societies, returned soldiers' societies and political bodies closing with a vast unclassified stream of simple citizens from nearly all parts of the dominion.

The Church Service  
Monsignor Dimaria, representative of the Pope in Canada, officiated at the church, assisted by other high dignitaries of the Church. Monsignor Routhier was assistant priest; Canons Campeau and Platin, deacons of honor and Father Myrand, of Ste. Anne's,

deacon of office. In the sanctuary were several archbishops and bishops, representatives of all the religious communities.

After the final absolution, the body was taken to its last resting place in Notre Dame cemetery. At the grave the last rites were performed by Father Lajune, of the Juniorate of the Sacred Heart.

"Why is the valiant man fallen who has redeemed Israel?"

The lament of people of Judea over the fallen Macabaeus was taken by Father Burke, of Toronto, as the text of his oration at the basilica. He described, with a facile touch, how Macabaeus led the people of Judah in battle how they humbled their enemies and how futilely, still waging battle, Macabaeus himself fell on the field of Edessa.

"The people of Israel had lost a leader," Father Burke said. "They had lost ideal. We have a leader. We have lost an ideal. And as we look upon you casket there, we can like the ancient men of Judea, exclaim 'Why is this valiant man fallen who has redeemed Israel.'"

"In the shadow of the national catastrophe," Father Burke went on, "there is a danger of exaggeration." But he thought that words which Sir Wilfrid had once used in respect of Louis Joseph Papineau was singularly applicable to Sir Wilfrid himself. The words were:

"He was a man fitted by nature to be the ideal of his people."

"His commanding presence, his majestic mien, his impassionate eloquence his disinterested love of country, his unblemished character maintained for him for years sway over his people."

### His Eloquence

Father Burke spoke of Sir Wilfrid's eloquence, giving instances of his command over public assemblies. Sir Wilfrid was a passionate lover of his country. One always felt in his presence that from knightly days gone by who had somehow assumed flesh to grace this practical world for a time. It was from the teachings of the church he followed, Father Burke continued, that Sir Wilfrid drew inspiration for his love of country for the church always taught love of country and willingness to give up one's life for country if need be.

He closed with a sympathetic reference to Lady Laurier and a few words to the distinguished pall bearers—"never so distinguished as this morning."

Archbishop Mathieu, of Regina, speaking in French said:

"He has gone before the tribunal of God to render account of his life, and impartial history will tell of his great frailties of mind and heart. But he is not dead. The soul of Sir Wilfrid Laurier lives in a world, a better world."

Monsignor Mathieu referred to the high esteem in which Sir Wilfrid was held by all sections in this community "He understood," Monsignor Mathieu went on, "and tried to make others understand that we are not born to hate each other, but to love each other. He was convinced and tried to convince others that we in Canada should be united in one heart and with the same devotion."

In memory of him, there should be endeavor to exercise those great principles of charity, toleration and justice which God had brought to earth.

"We should," Monsignor Mathieu added "bring unity where there is division; calm where there is discord; harmony where there is no peace. For these sentiments were the greatest sentiments in the heart of our illustrious dead."

Throughout it was necessary to restrict admissions strictly to ticket holders, but the fullness, and indeed the grandeur of the nation's tribute was seen more especially in the vast concourse of those who did not wait for the tickets or invitation to show their admiration for the "grand old man."
