

## PETITION THAT ORDERS IN COUNCIL BE PERMANENT

LARGELY SIGNED BY BAPTIST CONGREGATION

Want Manufacture, Importation and Inter-provincial Shipment of Liquor Stopped.

At the Sunday evening service at the Brunswick Street Baptist Church a petition to be presented to the House of Commons asking for the validation of the orders-in-council concerning the manufacture, importation, and inter-provincial shipment of liquor was circulated for signature. The petition was signed by over one hundred persons at the close of the service.

### Says Statement Incorrect

Rev. J. S. Sutherland, minister of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, has informed the Mail that the statement published Saturday by this paper to the effect that opposition had developed at a congregational meeting to a resolution to endorse Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson, was not correct. The resolution to which opposition developed dealt with another subject, according to Rev. Mr. Sutherland. The latter stated further that the ground of objection was not that the matter was political.

The Mail has been informed through other channels that the resolution to which opposition developed concerned Prohibition.

### Death From Pneumonia

The death occurred on Saturday afternoon at the Victoria Public Hospital following a short illness of pneumonia of Louis Goodine of Kingsclear. The deceased was forty-eight years of age and is survived by his mother and by two brothers. The body was taken to French Village this morning for interment. Service was held at St. Anne's Church, Kingsclear, by Rev. Father Howland.

### Visited Poultry Plants

Mr. A. C. McCulloch, provincial poultry superintendent returned on Saturday from a week's visit to poultry plants in the State of Maine, where he arranged for the purchase of about 12,000 eggs for hatching from Barred Plymouth Rock hens. These will be brought to the province early in the spring and distributed among poultry raisers. The hatching eggs brought from Maine last year turned out very satisfactorily and those interested in poultry will be glad to learn that another importation is to be made.

### Tourist Outlook Good

Mr. Charles Cremin, the well-known guide, returned Saturday from New York where he has been spending the past three weeks. He met many sports men during his stay in the city and was called upon to answer many enquiries concerning hunting in New Brunswick. ## APPRECIATION OF SIR WILFRID FROM PULPIT

REV. F. L. CARNEY AND REV. G. M. YOUNG

Fr. Carney Spoke of Deeply Religious Character—Rev. Mr. Young Mentioned High Moral Standard.

Words of appreciation of the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier were heard from Fredericton pulpits yesterday. Rev. F. L. Carney pastor of St. Dunstan's Roman Catholic Church and Rev. G. M. Young, pastor of the Fredericton Methodist Church, both speaking in eulogistic terms of the life of the ex-premier.

### Rev. Father Carney

Rev. Father Carney referred to the fact that it was while preparing to attend church that the deceased had been stricken with his fatal illness and pointed out that no person could be taken fatally ill under more admirable circumstances. Briefly reviewing his life Father Carney said that it should be an example to the young men and women of his congregation. He referred particularly to the charitable features of Sir Wilfrid's life and the deep religious feeling he always displayed.

### Rev. Mr. Young

At the Methodist Church last evening Rev. G. M. Young made a special reference to the life of the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Mr. Young introduced the topic by saying that Sir Wilfrid had given the Methodist Conference a very cordial welcome to the City of Ottawa. He referred to him as one of the leading men, highly respected by both parties and he dwelt for a short time on his history. He eulogized him as a fine type of manhood and paid tribute to the high moral character shown by him and also referred to him as one of the men who above all other things had lived a blameless life. He was a kindly dispositioned man and one that had gone out of his way to help others.

## RECORD OF MERIT FOR POULTRY IS TO BE KEPT

MALE BIRDS FIRST WILL BE DEALT WITH BY DEPT.

Canada's National Poultry Policy Outlined and Important Suggestions Made at Conference.

Mr. A. C. McCulloch returned from Ottawa after attending the Poultry Conference on Tuesday and Wednesday last. Mr. McCulloch speaks very highly of the plans discussed at the Conference for the establishment of a record of merit for male birds of poultry flocks. The record of merit will be somewhat the same as the record applied to cattle and horses. Through this plan the poultry department hopes to be able to work out a scheme for recording the performances of the male birds regarding their ability to produce fertile eggs and daughters with high egg-production. The plan will be started this summer in connection with male birds and will later include females.

### Culling of Hens

The movement for culling hens for egg production is becoming very popular and wide spread. It is common information among poultry-men that the past egg-production of a hen can be told with reasonable accuracy by the culling method, by means of the coloring of the beak, eyes, legs, etc. An extensive culling propaganda is being undertaken in the majority of the provinces and this work could be done in New Brunswick with remarkable results.

### National Poultry Policy

The National Poultry Committee was formed by the convention and a National Poultry Policy was decided upon. The policy is as follows:

1. Increased production.
2. Economic production through stock improvement.
3. Quality payment.
4. Co-operation in marketing.
5. Market intelligence.
6. Standardized product.
7. Service in transportation.
8. Perfection in storage.
9. Increased consumption.
10. Advertising and salesmanship in disposal of product at home and abroad.

### Ald. Baxter Will Offer

As a result of the meeting of the Fredericton Labor Council held Saturday evening to discuss the civic elections Ald. R. J. Baxter will again be a candidate in St. Anne's Ward. Ald.
