corner of Luxemburg. The Dantzig
area consists of the V between the
Negal and Vistula rivers made by the
addition of a similar V on the west
including the city of Dantzig. The
southeastern third of the Prussia and
the area between east Prussia and the
Vistula north of Latitude 53 degrees
35 minutes is to have its nationality
determined by popular vote, 5785
square miles as is to be the case in
part of Schelswig 2787 square miles.

NEW YORK IS NOW ONE OF THE GREATEST FUR MARKETS

Skins From All Parts of the World Disposed of at Recent Auc-
tion—Muskrat Headed the List With Over Half a Million
Pelts—Only Four Musk-ox Skins—Many Cat Skins Dis-
posed of, and the 'Possum is Also Numerous.

New York, May 4.—New York find-
ing itself, as one of the surprising re-
sults of war trade shifts, the world's
greatest fur market, a proper town
spirit requires some study of the in-
teresting facts revealed by a current
fur auction announcement.

It is not urged that much which
may be known to unrestrained stud-
ents of natural history should be ac-
quired by New Yorker offhand; that
would be too much of a task. Where,
even, could we easily find authorities
to tell the many interesting things
one hopes must be known to some-
body about the barundi, 19,000 of
whose kin have been taken to make
attractive a New York fur auction?
One feels uncertain even as to his habi-
tat, though the name somehow sug-
gests India, or perhaps Russia.

The muskrat furnished the most nu-
merous crop of skins; plain, unquali-
fied muskrat, 523,625; black, 34,798;
a total of 558,423; surely an impres-
sive number when compared with the
least numerous specimen offered, four
musk-ox skins. And what about musk-
—that animals so named in part are
most and least numerous represented
in the offering?

Some of the items suggest how suc-
cessful must be the recently establish-
ed industry of commercial breeding of
fur-bearing animals. The fox, we un-
derstand, is so bred, and his is the
family most variously represented by
coats of many colors. There are the
red, white, blue, gray, silver, cross and
Australian foxes; then there are the
many breeds suggested by the listing
of 6,187 "sundry" foxes, and a thou-
sand fox tails and paws.

The danger and sport of those who
supply New York's fur market are
abundantly indicated by the stock of
23,89 wolf skins, 294 wolverines, twelve
tigers; by the skins of lynx, wildcat,

leopard, bear, mountain lion.

But alas! One's imagination, alert
with pictures of daring and danger, of
tropic and Arctic zones, of mountain
camp fires, desert wastes, jungle dark-
ness, is rudely shunted to dingy back-
yards where dwells neither romance
nor sportsman's danger—house cats,
32,783 skins.

But let us forget poor, friendless
tabby, slain to make a leopard skin,
perhaps, and consider the opossum.
We do not know how it may be with
others; nature students know much,
or pretend to, yet dream little, but we
have always associated in thoughts
on the opossum something wholly Am-
erican, something Southern—pineknott
torches, negroes of the "uncle Tom"
or "uncle Joe" variety, white folks of
quality and sporting tastes.

We seem to have missed out some-
where along the line of our pleas-
ant thoughts, for in this fascinating
catalogue of furs we find the opossum
running the pesky mole a close race
for second place to the muskrat for
high census figures, the record being
mole skins 292,823, opossum 279,974.

And no less than 25,533 were not Am-
erican, but bear the title Australian.
Popular judgment as to the cunning of
the opossum must be revised if our de-
ductions from these disappointing fig-
ures are correct, and what credit for
the quality of cunning is awarded must
go to the ring-tailed variety, be he for-
eign or domestic, for of this kind only
the comparatively small number of
15,941 permitted themselves to be
dressed up for a visit to America's
great metropolis.

No less than 226,500 American opos-
sum, the variety around which our
fancy played such foolish tricks, the
fellow we in imagination see eluding
sportsmen, dogs and pineknott flames,
took off their coats to be polite to the
ladies.

of them. Time will make a pillar of
society out of a horse-thief.
