THE GERMANS WERE IMPUDENT AND AGGRESSIVE

In Spite of the Arrogance of Their Peace Delegates Yesterday was a Day of Humiliation for Them—Some Additional Sections of the Peace Treaty—Germany to Pay for or Restore All Property Seized by Her.

London, May 8—After the conference at Versailles yesterday, Premier Hughes, of Australia, said, according to a Reuter despatch:

"The attitude of Count Von Brockdorff-Rantzau was an intolerable insult to the conference, for, while Premier Clemenceau spoke standing, the German spoke and did not raise while making his address. In spite of their intolerable arrogance, this has been a day of humiliation for the Germans, which we could see had entered into their souls."

Premier Massey, of New Zealand, said: "The Germans were more impudent and aggressive than anything I have ever met."

The following are additional sections of the peace treaty:

A system of clearing houses is to be created within three months, one in Germany and one in each Allied and associated state which adopts the plan for the payment of pre-war debts, including those arising from contracts suspended by the war for the adjustment of the proceeds of the liquidation of enemy property and the settlement of other obligations. Each participant state assumes responsibility for the payment of all debts owing by its nationals to nationals of the enemy states except in cases of pre-war insolvency of the debtor.

Any Ally or Associated Power may, however decline to participate in this system by giving Germany six months notice.

Enemy Property

Germany shall restore or pay all private enemy property seized or damaged by her, the amount of damages to be fixed by the mixed tribunal. The Allied and Associated States may liquidate German property within their territories as compensation for property of their nationals not restored or paid for by Germany.

Contracts

Pre-war contracts between Allied and Associated Nationals, excepting the United States, Japan and Brazil and German nationals are cancelled except for debts.

Except as between the United States and Germany pre-war licenses and rights to sue for infringements committed during the war are cancelled.

Powers to which German territory is acceded will assume a certain portion of the German pre-war debt, the amount to be fixed by the repatriation commission on the basis of the ratio between the revenue of the ceded territory and Germany's total revenues for the three years preceeding the war. in 1871 when Germany refused to accept any part of the French public debt, France will not assume any part of Germany's pre-war debt there, nor will Poland share in certain German debts incurred for the oppression of Poland. Germany is required to pay the total cost of the armies of occupation from the date of the armistice as long as they are maintained in German territory this cost to be a first charge on her resources. The cost of repatriation is the next charge, after making such provision for payments for imports as the Allies may deem necessary.

Germany is to deliver to the Allies and Associated Powers all sums deposited in Germany by Turkey and Austria-Hungary in connection with the financial support extended by her to them during the war and to transfer to the Allies all claims against Austria-Hungary, but gave Turkey in connection with the agreements made during the war. Germany confirms the renunciation of the treaties of Bucharest and Brest-Litovsk.

On the request of the repatriation Commission, Germany will expropriate any rights or interests of her nationals in public utilities in ceded territory of those administered by mandatories and in Turkey, China, Russia, Austria-Hungary and Bulgaria, and transfer them to the repatriation commission which will credit her with their value. Germany guarantees to repay to Brazil the fund arising from the sale of Sao Paulo Coffee which she refused to allow Brazil to withdraw from Germany.

Czecho-Slovakia

To assure Czecho-Slovakia access to the sea, special rights are given her both north and south. Towards the Adriatic, she is permitted to run her own through trains to Fiume and Trieste. To the north Germany is to lease her for 99 year space in Hamburg and Stettin, the details to be worked out by a commission of three representing Czecho-Slovakia, Germany and Great Britain.

The Kiel Canal

The Kiel Canal is to remain free and open to war and merchant ships of all nations at peace with Germany, subjects, goods and ships of all states are to be treated on terms of absolute equality and no taxes to be imposed beyond those necessary for upkeep and improvement for which Germany is to be responsible. In case of violation of or disagreement as to these provisions any state may appeal to the League of Nations, and may demand the appointment of an international commission. For preliminary hearing of complaints Germany may establish a local authority at Kiel.

Aerial Navigation

Aircraft of the Allied and Associated Powers shall have full liberty of passage and landing over and in German territory, equal treatment with German plans as to use of German air-dromes and with most favored nation planes as to intercommercial traffic in Germany.

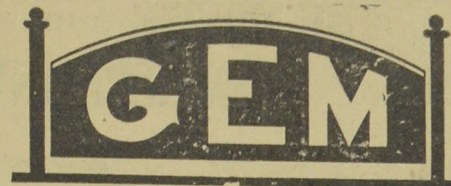
Germany agrees to accept certificates of nationality, air worthiness or competency of licenses and to apply the convention relative to aerial navigation concluded between the Allied and Associated Powers to her own aircraft over her own territory. These rules apply until 1923 unless Germany has since admitted to the League of Nations or to the above convention.

An Alert Gardener
