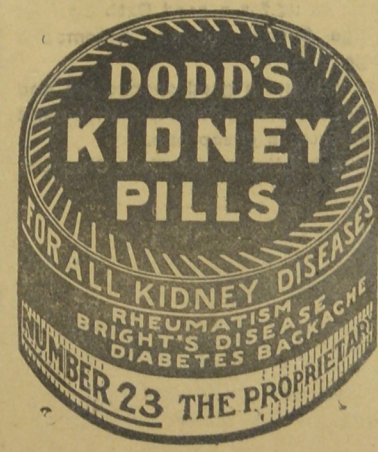

the King of Spain, at Aix les Bains.

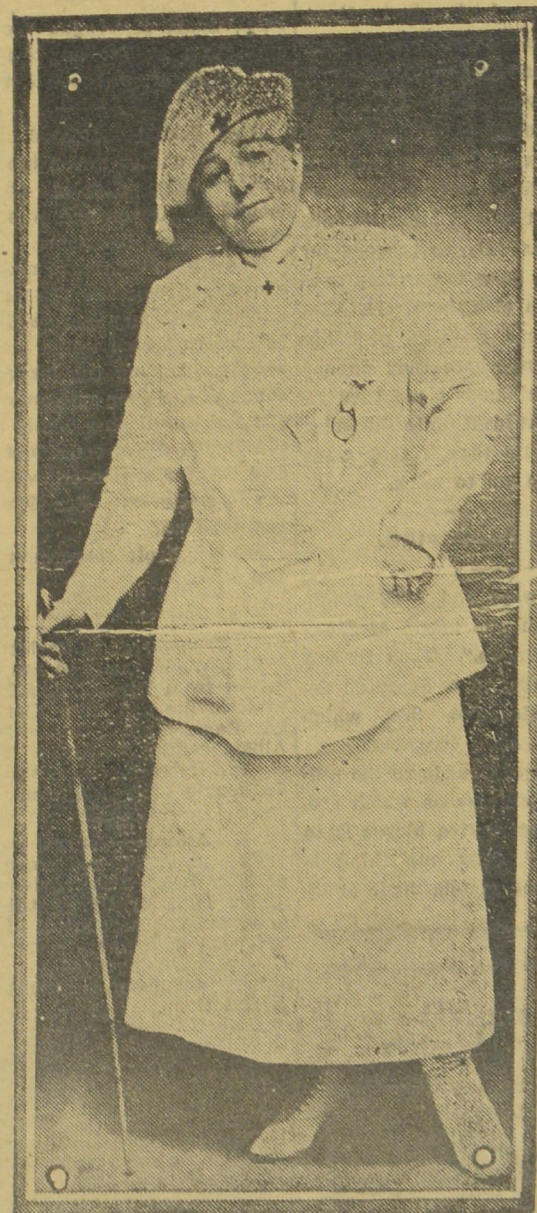
In a letter received by his sister
