Mothers are Now Considering the Summer Outfit of Their Little Ones.

Japanese crepe, because it is pretty and inexpensive, must necessarily become a popular material, both for girls' frocks and for tunic and knicker suits for tiny boys. A touch of hand-worked embroidery redeems these suits from the commonplace. Little girls more often than not discard (and most willingly) petticoats, and are clad in woven combinations—a vest if the weather is chilly, and knickers and tunic frock of some pretty material, an outfit at once sensible, becoming and economical, which is finished off on a dull damp day with a knitted coat or jumper or a wrap coat of flannel worked in blanket stitching.

Nothing is prettier for a small girl than a short white pique skirt and knickers worn with a jumper of rose red or emerald green wool and a white tam o' shanter made of the pique.

The small close-fitting caps for summer are charmingly trimmed with a wreath of leaves or bunches of tiny grapes and leaves, or there may be just a cluster of fruit and foliage, such as cherries and little apples.

These bunches can be made at home. Take wads of cotton wool and small squares of the chosen silk or gauze, put the wad inside the silk, and secure them at the base with a stitch. Mount these berries, grapes or other fruit on milliner's wire covered with gold or silver thread, and form them into small bunches. For the leaves, take some gold gauze material and cut it out in ivy like leaves; to make the leaves stronger, mount the gauze on book muslin. Bronze or pale green velvet leaves can be made by cutting out shapes from velveteen, making the veins by simply heating a knitting needle in a lamp flame and using it like a pen or pencil.

**DO YOUR SUNDAY COOKING EARLY.**

**Beef and Macaroni.**

1 pound round steak put through a meat chopper, one-third pkg. macaroni, half can tomatoes, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 tablespoon bread crumbs, salt and pepper. Mix well together, if not moist enough add a little milk or cream; place in a greased baking dish and bake for three-quarters of an hour. Excellent way of using cold cooked left over meat. Bake only 30 minutes.

**Original Sponge Cake.**

Two eggs, quarter teaspoon salt, three-quarters cup of sugar, half cup of pastry flour, half cup ordinary flour, two teaspoons baking powder, half cup hot milk, half teaspoon vanilla. Beat the eggs and salt together with egg beater for five minutes. Sift dry ingredients and beat with first mixture. Then beat all together and bake about 25 minutes in a medium oven. The secret of success in a sponge cake is long and steady beating.

**Popovers.**

Break one egg into cup filled with milk, pour in bowl and add one cupful sifted flour, one-half teaspoonful salt. Beat, using Dover egg-beater, for five minutes, fill into smoking hot, well-greased popover pans and bake for twenty minutes in slow oven, making

**BRIEF BUT USEFUL RECIPES.**

Restore Gilt Frames.—Rub with a sponge moistened with turpentine.

Drive Away Ants.—A little quick lime placed in the infested places.

Remove Tar from Cloth.—Rub it well with turpentine till every trace is removed.

Make Leather Waterproof.—Saturate it with castor oil; to stop shoes squaking, drive a peg into the middle of the sole.

Clean the Hair.—Wash well with a mixture of soft water, 1 pint; sal soda 1 ounce; cream tartar ¼ ounce.

Egg Stains on Spoons.—Rub with common salt.

Clean Gloves.—Pour a little benzine into a basin and wash the gloves in it, rubbing and squeezing them until clean. If much soiled, they must be washed again through clean benzine and rinsed in a fresh supply. Hang in the air to dry.

Clean Hair Brushes.—Dissolve a little soda in warm water and pour in a small amount of ammonia. Hold the brushes with the bristles downward and avoid wetting the back as far as possible; shake until the grease is removed; then rinse in cold water and put in the air to dry.

Remove Mildew from Cloth.—Put a teaspoonful of chloride of lime into a quart of water, strain it twice, then dip the mildewed places in this weak solution and lay in the sun. If not effective the first time repeat.

How to Remove a Rusty Screw.—Apply a red hot iron to the head for a short time, the screw-driver being applied immediately while the screw is hot.

Cure Mosquito Bites.—Put ten drops of refined carbolic acid into an ounce of rose water; shake well and apply. (If you hold your breath while a mosquito has its bill in you it cannot withdraw it until you breathe again).

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
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
