

C. N. R. UNDER RAILWAY COM. RE FOREST FIRES

EFFORTS OF MINISTER CROWNED WITH SUCCESS

Details to be Worked Out—Prof. C. D. Howe of Toronto, to Study Forest Growth.

The Department of Lands and Mines has been notified by telegram from Ottawa that the Canadian National Railways have come under the control of the Railway Commission in the matter of protection of forest lands from fire. The details of the matter will have to be worked out between the C. N. R. and the Railway Commission. Three inspectors of the Department of Lands and Mines are officials of the Railway Commission.

Aim of Minister

For some time the Minister of Lands and Mines, Hon. E. A. Smith, has endeavored to have the C. N. R. placed in the same position as privately owned railways as far as the protection of the forests from fire is concerned and the announcement today means that he has reached his goal.

To Study Forest Growth

Prof. C. D. Howe of Toronto University who was in New Brunswick for a short time last year studying annual forest growth for the Commission on Conservation will spend one month in the province this year beginning on the 18th inst. Prof. Howe will go to Doaktown and will join a survey party some forty miles in the woods from that point.

GREAT ARRAY OF WITNESSES IN BEES BEER CASE

JOHN WRIGHT KEPT AND SOLD THE BEER

Case Adjourned Until Friday Next—An Attempt Being Made to Clean up the "Black Hills."

The case against John Wright, colored of the "Black Hills" Devon, came before Police Magistrate Limerick this morning. Wright was charged with keeping and selling Bees Beer, violating the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916. Seven witnesses were heard in the case of selling the beer and the case was then adjourned until Friday next. The witnesses called were Mr. and Mrs. Martin Paul of the Devon Indian Reserve, John Kennedy and Abram Holmes, colored, Edward Pratt Mrs. Eliza McCoy and Charlotte Cornam. Two of the witnesses George Golding and Laura Golding better known as Laura Addison failed to make their appearance.

Following investigations Chief of Police Finley and Constable Charles Barker had a warrant sworn out for the arrest of Wright on a charge of keeping and selling Bees Beer. Two jugs of the beer were found on the Golding premises and these were seized as well. The seizure of six gallons of the beer was made on Saturday. The evidence this morning showed that Wright has for some time been selling the beer.

The authorities have been for some time engaged in cleaning up the section known as the "Black Hills Plantation" and their first seizure of intoxicants will in all probability lead to others.

FRANK O'NEILL READMITTED TO N. B. BAR

RECENTLY RETURNED FROM OVERSEAS SERVICE

Arthur J. Cyr, of Edmundston, Also Admitted—Verdict in Fairbrother Suit is Sustained.

Mr. Justice Grimmer presided at the sitting of the Appeal Division, Supreme Court of New Brunswick this morning.

Mr. Frank O'Neill of Fredericton was admitted as barrister-at-law and readmitted to practise as attorney-at-law having been abroad from the province for upwards of five years. Mr. O'Neill is a son of ex-Ald. Hugh O'Neill of this city and recently returned after service overseas in the C. E. F. Prior to enlistment he practised law in the West.

Mr. Arthur J. Cyr of Edmundston who had been admitted to the bar of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia on the reciprocity rule between the two provinces was admitted attorney-at-law and barrister-at-law of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick.

Judgements Delivered

In Fairbrother, administratrix vs. Fegles-Bellows Engineering Company Judge Grimmer read the judgment of the court dismissing the appeal of the defendant company with costs. The effect of this judgment is that the verdict of the jury for \$10,000 in favor of the administratrix on account of the death of her husband, is sustained. The deceased lost his life by accident during the construction of an elevator at St. John.

In Bathurst Lumber Co. vs. Harris, Judge Grimmer delivered judgement of the court dismissing the appeal of the plaintiff company. By this the finding of Chief Justice McKeown of the Court of King's Bench as to the counter claim of the defendant is sustained.

In the birthday honor list recently published two St. John officers are honored by being made members of the Distinguished Service Order, Major Cyrus Inches, M. C., and Major T. E. Ryder, M. C. 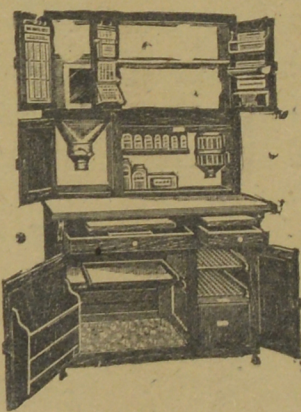
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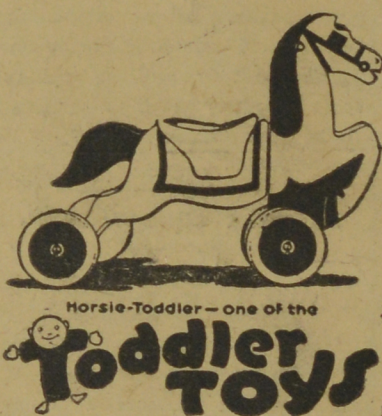
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
