## A TRIBUTE TO FRANCE.

President Wilson delivered an important speech at a luncheon given in his honor at the Luxemburg Palace a few days ago. He pointed out among other things to the peril which threatened France, and declared that not only France, but the world, must organize against this peril. The President, of course, had reference to the German menace, which has not only been a peril, but a challenge, to the French people for more than forty years. Here are his words:

"There is a new, awakened world. It is not ahead of us, but around us. It knows that its dearest interests are involved in its standing together for a common purpose. It knows that the peril of France, if it continues, will be the peril of the world. It knows that not only France must organize against this peril, but that the world must organize against it.

"So I see in these welcomes not only hospitality, not only kindness, not only hope, but a purpose—a definite, clearly defined purpose—that men, understanding one another, must now support one another, and that all the sons of freedom are under a common oath to see that freedom never suffers this danger again. That, to my mind, is the impressive element of this welcome. I know how much of it, sir, and I know how little of it to appropriate to myself.

"I know that I have the very distinguished honor to represent a nation whose heart is in this business, and I am proud to speak for the people whom I represent. But I know that you honor me in a representative capacity. I delight in this welcome, therefore, as if I had brought the people of the United States with me and they could see in your faces what I see in the tokens of welcome and affection.

"The sum of the whole matter is that France has earned and has won the brotherhood of the world. She has stood at the chief post of danger and the thoughts of mankind and her brothers everywhere—her brothers in freedom—turn to her and centre upon her. If this be true, as I believe it to be, France is fortunate to have suffered. She is fortunate to have proved her mettle as one of the champions of liberty, and she has tied to herself once and for all, all those who love freedom and truly believe in the progress and rights of man."

## REFORM IS NEEDED.

The military court martial at Ottawa which imposed a sentence of life imprisonment upon a young man by the name of Cyr, charged with desertion, must have been under the impression that he also committed murder. Fortunately for the prisoner, a higher power reviewed the case and commuted the sentence to two years with hard labor. Over in Halifax a number of sailor boys, belonging to good families, are serving a term of eighteen months in Rockland prison because they complained that a trawler on which they were serving was unseaworthy. The young men were court-martialed, taken to Halifax in irons and cast into Rockland prison, which has the reputation of being one of the toughest penal institutions in Canada.

Mayor Hawkins, of Halifax, is of opinion that the boys got a "raw deal" and has brought their case to the notice of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

Now that German militarism is in a fair way to become abolished, the Canadian authorities should take steps to prevent the introduction of German military methods into Canada. In order to do this it may be necessary to institute some reforms in connection with military courts martial. If men with a sense of justice and fair play cannot be found to serve upon them, they should be done away with altogether, and refractory soldiers and sailors turned over to the civil authorities for punishment.

Called to Hanwell to look after underfed cattle, but found barn in good condition.

Called to Nashwaaksis to look after cattle and horses not properly fed.

Called on to shoot two horses, unfit for work; also one dog shot because of a broken leg.

Called to Devon to look after horses not properly cared for.

Called to Devon to look into case of horse being cruelly treated by a syrian, who was later, brought up in Court and fined \$25.

Called to shoot a horse on Woodstock road which had a broken leg; also shot one dog on Charlotte street.

Called to North Devon to look after sick horses; laid them off for two weeks and had them sent to veterinary surgeon.

Called to look after overladen horses.

Laid complaint before Police Magistrate against Sunbury man for ill-treatment of a bull; witness failed to appear; case settled by party complained of paying costs.

Complaint laid against parties for keeping unsanitary stables and not properly feeding cattle; they were fined \$50 and costs.
