SOCIETY FOR PREVENTION OF CRUELTY, ANNUAL MEETING

Financial Condition of Society Sound—Reports of President L. C. Macnutt, Agent James Roberts and the Treasurer, Miss Jeannette Beverley, Received—Aid Given the Society at Halifax—Number of Cases in Police Court.

The annual meeting of the Fredericton Society for the Prevention of Cruelty, postponed from October on account of the Board of Health ban, was held Wednesday afternoon at the office of the president, among those present being Mrs. J. H. Estabrooks, Miss Jeannette Beverley, Mrs. W. P. Keenan, Miss Edith Gregory, Rev. J. S. Sutherland, J. W. Spurdun, J. H. Fleming and L. C. Macnutt.

President's Report

President Macnutt was in the chair, and after reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting by the secretary-treasurer, Miss Beverley, the president read his annual report, as follows:

To the Officers and Members of the Fredericton S. P. C.

Ladies and Gentlemen:
At the outset, I desire to say that this annual meeting, which was due to be held last October, had, of necessity to be postponed on account of the Board of Health ban on public gatherings, and I have convened at the earliest possible moment, taking into account the condition mentioned, as well as the necessity of a few days for advertising and preparing the annual reports. I would suggest that hereafter we close our fiscal year with the end of the calendar year so as to coincide with that of the Parent Society, and that the bye-laws be amended in that respect, as well as to change the date of the annual meeting to say, the second Wednesday in January of each year.

Successful Year

Reviewing the work of the Society for the past fourteen months there is little of interest to remark, except to express pleasure that we have been able to pay all our expenses and add a tidy sum to our former surplus. Full details of our financial standing are shown in the Treasurer's statement. We have found a willingness on the part of the public to extend a hearty support to the Society, notwithstanding the many other calls for money for patriotic and Red Cross purposes. To Miss Beverley, Mrs. Rowan and Mrs. Macnutt is due the credit of collecting the bulk of the subscriptions, and they met with practically no refusals.

Contribution to Halifax

An appeal was made to us for a contribution to the Nova Scotia Society to relieve its finances after the Halifax Explosion, as many animals were homeless after that great disaster, and after consultation with members of our Executive, I forwarded a cheque for \$25.00 to Lieut. Governor Grant, president of the Nova Scotia Society for which I received grateful acknowledgement through Secretary Murray who wrote:

"I am instructed by Lieut. Governor Grant to thank you sincerely for the very generous contribution of your Society to ours in this time of distress. The amount sent by you will be used at once for the relief of suffering, and we will ever bear the kindness of the Fredericton Society in our memory."

Work of Agent

The report of Agent Roberts shows

that he has been diligent in the discharge of his duties and has in a large measure been the means of reducing the cases of cruelty in the city to a minimum, most of his calls coming from outside districts. It is often remarked to me that the mere fact that such a society as ours exists, is a strong deterrent to those who might otherwise be guilty of cruelty, and added to this is the prompt measures taken by the Agent in the prosecution of cases that are reported to him, or that fall under his own observation, thus greatly improving conditions since this Society was re-organized five years ago.

One of the duties devolving on your President is to make a written report annually before February, to the Parent Society at St. John; this I have done, and in acknowledgement of my last report, I received a very courteous and satisfactory letter from the Secretary of the Parent Society, from which I quote:—"St. John, February 8th, 1918. I was pleased to receive the annual report of the Fredericton S. P. C. so promptly, also to note the good work Agent Roberts is doing. I also note with pleasure how well you are getting on financially, which shows that you and your officers are on their job. Yours, etc. S. W. Wetmore, Secretary."

From the last annual address of President Frink of the Parent Society as published in the St. John Globe of February 19th, 1918, I take the liberty of quoting as follows:—"The Fredericton Branch, organized but a few years ago, continues doing splendid work, and the report of Mr. L. C. Macnutt, the president, which will be laid before you, is most satisfactory and encouraging. Both in personnel and activity this branch occupies a commanding position, and we have no doubt that the interest displayed will be maintained until it shall have become the leader in the province."

I may add in conclusion, that each year I have received from the Secretary of the Parent Society an invitation to attend its annual meeting in St. John, and if conditions are favorable, I hope to be present at the next meeting in February. Thanking the officers for their co-operation during the past year, I shall close.

Since December 31st, 1919, \$3.73 was paid for advertising, old account.

The Society will thus have a balance of \$150.30, Feb. 1st, 1919, with all bills paid.

Agent's Report

The report of Agent James Roberts was read by the president, as follows: To the President, Officers and Members of the S. P. C.:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

The work of the Society entrusted to me has been carried on during the past year to the best of my ability, and all cases reported to me or coming under my own observation, have been promptly dealt with.

I have to report the following:

Called to the C. P. R. to look after two car loads of cattle shipped to Montreal in November. Also two unfit horses were shot, and two dogs and one cat, run over by automobiles and injured, were shot.

Called in December to shoot a dog whose back had been broken by being run over by a team.

Called to Devon to look after cattle not properly housed.

Called to Lower St. Mary's to look after horses not properly housed.

Called to Nashwaakisis to look after underfed cattle; got blankets and feed for them.
