## HAWKER AND GRIEVE WERE PICKED UP AT SEA

**Intrepid British Aviators Who Started to Fly Across the Atlantic Were Rescued by a Danish Tramp Steamer—Were in the Water Only 90 Minutes—Landed in Scotland and are None the Worse for Their Experience.**

London, May 25—Harry G. Hawker and Lieutenant-Commander McKenzie Grieve, the two airmen who started last Sunday in an attempt to fly across the Atlantic ocean from St. John's, Nfld, have been picked up at sea and landed in Scotland.

Both men are in perfect health.

It is officially announced by the Admiralty that both aviators were picked up in north latitude 50.20, west longitude 29.30, having alighted close to the little Danish steamer, Mary, owing to a stoppage of circulation in the water pipes between the radiator and the water pump. The airplane, a Sopwith machine, was not salvaged.

The first report of the aviators since their famous "ump-off" last Sunday came when the Mary, which was bound from Norfolk to Aarhus, Denmark, rounded the Butt of Lewis today and wig-wagged the fact that she had Hawker and Grieve aboard.

"Saved hands of Sopwith airplane," was the signal.

"Is it Hawker?" was the question sent out by the flags from the Butt, which is the most northwesterly point of the Hebrides group off Scotland.

"Yes," replied the vessel.

Warship D'spatched

The Admiralty immediately sent out a fast torpedo boat destroyer in an endeavor to intercept the Mary and take off the aviators. There was an anxious wait for several hours, when the word was flashed that the destroyer had come across the steamer and transferred Hawker and Grieve, and was taking them to Thurze, on the northern coast of Scotland about 100 miles east of the Butt of Lewis.

The destroyer the Revenge reported to the Admiralty this evening that Hawker and Grieve would sleep on board tonight.

The aviators will reach London at 7 o'clock Tuesday evening.

In Water One and One-Half Hours

London, May 25—Hawker and Grieve were in the water for an hour and a half before being taken aboard the steamer Mary.

Hawker has sent the following message from the Revenge to the Daily Mail.

"My machine stopped owing to the water filter in the feed pipe from the radiator to the water pump being blocked with refuse, such as solder, the like shaking loose in the radiator.

"It was no fault of the Rolls-Royce motor which ran absolutely perfectly from start to finish, even when all the water had boiled away.

"He had no trouble in standing on the sea where we were picked up by the tramp steamer Mary, after being in the water for ninety minutes. We leave Thurze at 3 p.m. Monday, arriving in London Tuesday evening."

Will Get £5,000

London, May 25—The London Daily Mail which offered a purse of £10,000 for the first flight for a heavier-than-air craft across the Atlantic ocean will give Hawker and Grieve a consolation prize of £5,000.

Mrs. Hawker Gets News

London, May 25—Mrs. Hawker wife of the aviator received the news from the Mary early this morning at her home near Surbiton and posted a notice outside her home reading:

"Mr. Hawker has been found. He is on the boat Mary bound for Denmark."

A crowd of villagers soon gathered and showered Mrs. Hawker with congratulations.

Good News Signalled

Lacking a wireless outfit, the captain was obliged to withhold the good tidings of the rescue until he was opposite Butt of Lewis, where the information was signalled by means of flags that Hawker and Grieve were aboard his ship.

Lightened Weight

When the airplane sped away from her starting point Pilot Hawker let loose his whole landing fear, thereby lightening the weight of the machine by a considerable amount, but making a possible landing on the soil of Ireland a more hazardous venture. This, however probably proved of much advantage when it became necessary to alight on the surface of the water. The airplane remained afloat without difficulty during the hour and a half it took for the Danish steamer to come up and effect a rescue.

All England Stirred

All England is stirred by the news of the safety of these two stout-hearted aviators, but owing to the difficulties of communication some time must pass before the full details of one of the most remarkable voyages ever undertaken are known.

The one person in England who had always held hope was Mrs. Hawker. She always maintained that Providence would protect her man, and though she received condolences from all classes of people, including the King, she said today that she had never ceased to believe that some time and in some way her husband would come back.

## VICTORIA DAY WELL OBSERVED IN THIS CITY

**G. W. V. A. HAD GREAT SUCCESS WITH FESTIVAL**

**Matinee Horse Races Well Attended—Many Fishing Parties—Two Ball Games During Day.**

Victoria Day was heartily celebrated in Fredericton the weather being fine and permitting all who wished to thoroughly enjoy themselves both within and without the city. The all-day festival of the Fredericton Branch Great War Veterans' Association, was crowned with great success, the gross receipts being \$1,100. A festival was held in the Officers' Square in the afternoon and at night and a dance also was held in the old Gaiety Theatre. The G.W.V.A. band recently organized under the leadership of Bandmaster James White, marched to the Officers' Square and also played a program there. Other features of the day were the ball games at the College Field in which the Imperials and the N. B. Military Hospital teams broke even. At the trotting park the Fredericton Park Association ran matinee races which were well attended. The meet dragged considerably, however, and the spectators were not slow in expressing displeasure at that feature. Trout streams for miles around were whipped by parties from Fredericton but high water prevented any phenomenal catches. Picture theatres did a large holiday business.

The Matinee Races

The matinee races attracted a large crowd. Free-for-all was in mile heats with Roy Volo, a Fredericton horse and Adioo Guy, owned in Halifax, the contestants. Roy Volo was winner of both heats, the time being 2.19 and 2.26. Garry A. was the winner of the 2.16 class in two heats, half mile each; Jesse H. was second, time 1.10 and 1.13. Half mile heats also were run in the 2.20 class with Shadeland Faussetta, Doctor Mac and Starr Todd finishing in the order named. Time 1.10 and 1.13.

The four-year-old trot was also in half mile heats, Bill Sharon winning from The Manor and Lochiel. Time 1.15 and 1.17.

Bill Sharon was first in both heats. In the first heat The Manor was third and Lochiel second and in the third the positions were reversed.

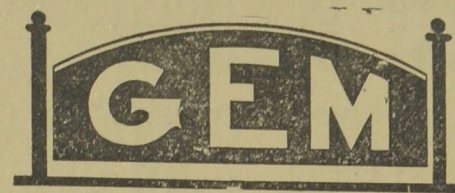
