RULE OF THE ROAD WILL NOT BE CHANGED THIS YEAR

Communication From the New Brunswick Tourist Association Considered by the Government—Age Limit for Normal School Students Restored to Seventeen Years—Important Meeting of the Board of Education.

ST. JOHN, Day 2—Much routine business was transacted by the local government executive yesterday. Two matters were of general interest. The first was the request for the subsidy towards the running of the steamer Keith Cann between here and Yarmouth. The matter was brought before the government and it is very probable that the subsidy will be renewed. The second was a strong request by a delegation representing the Tourist Association for changing the rule of the road. However, the request was not acceded to as the difficulties in changing the rule at this time of the year are too outstanding and with the majority of the people in the eastern counties near Nova Scotia opposed to the change, it was decided to leave the rule "drive to the left," as it is.

Board of Education

The question regarding the use of public school buildings as social centres was discussed at the meeting of the Provincial Board of Education yesterday. Dr. H. S. Bridges and A. M. Belding were heard and after further consideration by the board it was intimated that it was likely that arrangements would be made by which the use of school buildings for other than school purposes would be permitted.

The usual grant was made to the Reading Camp Association; a petition from the arts students of the U. N. B. for the reduction of the requirements for grammar school licenses was refused.

In consideration of the fact that her services were given at the request of the Transvaal government, the board agreed to allow the time she spent in South Africa on the pension term of Miss Iva Yerxa.

As the last school day of this term falls on Monday June 30, the recommendation of the chief superintendent that any Saturday in June may be taken as a substitute teaching day was accepted.

Inspector Meagher was given the scholarship for the summer course of 1919 as authorized by the board.

The chief superintendent asked for instructions regarding text books and it was ordered that no new text books be purchased until prices are more reasonable.

The chief superintendent also presented the matter of a four-year high school course to provide for a choice among the present curriculum, a commercial or an industrial course as best adapted to the needs of the locality and the pupil. The matter was laid over for further consideration.

It was ordered that, beginning June 1, 1920, the minimum age for admission to the normal school should be the same as before the war, viz., seventeen years.

Considerable other business of a routine nature was transacted.

All members of the government with the exception of the attorney-general who is ill, were present, with the chief superintendent, Dr. W. S. Carter, and Chancellor Jones.

The government executive will not meet again until the latter part of the month.

ist who recently returned from overseas has accepted the position of Inspector of Fire Protective Appliances on Locomotives for the Forestry Department of the Government, Mr. McIntyre by co-operative arrangement with the Railway Commission, is also District Fire Inspector for the Commission. His duties involve the periodic inspection of the nettings in the smokeboxes of locomotives and also ashtrays. Over 200 locomotives operate in New Brunswick, owned by the C. N. R., C. P. R., Caraque, Temiscouata Kent Northern, and Fredericton & Grand Lake Railways. His work also covers the supervision of more than twenty railway fire patrolmen. Mr. McIntyre's work is especially concerned with Forest Fire Protection.

Other Appointments

Pte. H. C. Lynn, also a returned soldier, has accepted a position as Asst. Railway Fire Patrolman from Campbellton to White's Brook on the International branch of the C. N. R. in Restigouche County.

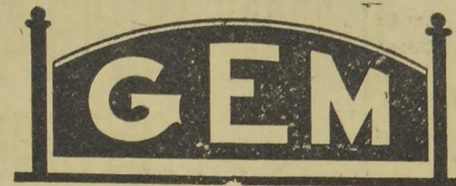
Pte. James F. Lawney, of Waasiss, N. B. is the second returned soldier, having the necessary two years' experience in scaling logs, to apply for a Forest Ranger's position. Mr. Lawney will take the Rangers' examination in Fredericton early in June when examinations will be held to fill a considerable number of vacancies in the staff of Forest Rangers.

Pte. J. E. Bourdages was the first returned soldier to apply who had the necessary two years' experience as a scaler. He passed the examination last year and was offered a permanent position, which he was unable to accept on account of his health, as he was suffering severely from shell shock. Later he was able to carry out an assistant scaler's duties and occupied this position during the past season.

CARRANZA'S MESSAGE TO U. S. CONGRESS

Mexico City, May 2—President Carranza is to submit to the extraordinary session of congress which convened today the outline of a law on petroleum which would develop article 27 of the constitution so as to "consolidate the source of national wealth according to law and equity, destroy special privileges and place Mexicans and foreigners on the same footing and give the state even less than foreign legislation gives other states in the same matters."

This was the leading topic of the president's message outlining the purpose for which he had called the extraordinary session which is expected to seek legislation on matters of international importance. The message was read to congress late tonight.

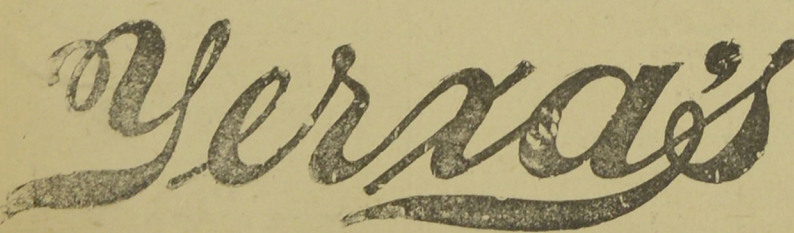
