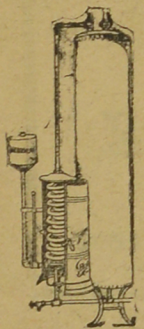

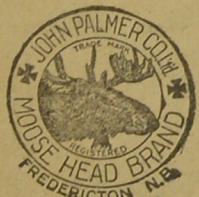

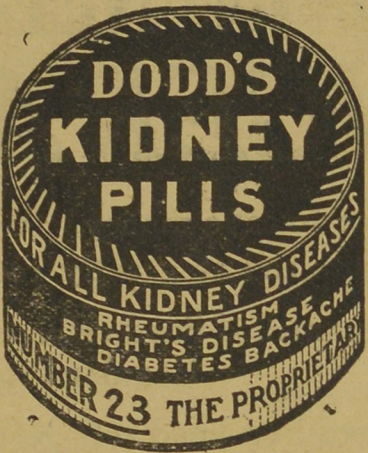


MAIL CONTRACT.

CABINET RE-CONSTRUCTION GOING ON AT OTTAWA

Sir Thomas White will Remain as Premier or Not at All—

Sir Robert Borden was Ready to Retire, but Changed His

Mind—MacLean and Carvell Not Likely to Stay in Cabin-

et—Sir Joseph Flavelle Mentioned for Finance Portfolio.

Ottawa, July 12.—Cabinet reconstruction is on in earnest, and much sooner than expected. In this correspondence some weeks ago, or about the time of Sir Robert Borden's return from the peace conference, it was mentioned that Sir Thomas White would either remain in the cabinet as premier, or not at all. He had had a taste of the leadership, and liked it; and, what is more, was liked by those whom he led. It was then thought that Sir Robert Borden was on the eve of retiring to accept one of several positions with which his name had been persistently connected; in fact he had told more than one Canadian who met him in France that such was his intention; he had tired of the strain of Canadian politics and was willing to let some one else take the helm.

What arose since to change his mind on that subject, and hasten his departure for home, is not known. Probably the intentions of Sir Thomas White had a good deal to do with it. What those intentions were we can only speculate. Sir Thomas stated during the present week that such personal speculations on the part of the press were unfair. He also made the statement that he had been adhering to the rule of not being interviewed. He thus closes all doors to the news-writer, which is itself hardly a fair position for an old newspaper man to take.

It is generally assumed that, had he been able to remain as premier, the late minister of finance would have endured for some time longer the undoubted sacrifice he has been making by remaining in politics; but the position of second fiddle was not sufficiently attractive, with the small financial reward for the enormous amount of work and worry entailed. Sir Robert Borden showing no intention of retiring, the natural sequence was that he should find a new minister of finance.

Cabinet Reconstruction

The resignation of Sir Thomas White undoubtedly means a great loss to the country at this time. His career in the house has been one of steady growth in usefulness and influence; and no other single member of the cabinet could have been less easily spared. His departure makes the work of reconstruction with which the premier is confronted, immensely more difficult. Hon. A. K. HON. MR. CARVELL HAS ABANDONED WESTERN TRIP

Ottawa, July 15.—Hon. Frank Carvell, Minister of Public Works, is expected in Ottawa either tomorrow or the next day. It is definitely stated here today that he will not go west on departmental business, as previously reported. His return is awaited with great interest as it has been freely stated that the minister went east to canvass the political situation in his riding and province in order to help himself in coming to a decision at this crisis in his fortunes. His best friends profess themselves uncertain as to his intentions.

All recommendations regarding the method of voting, preparing resolutions and debates, at the National Liberal convention on August 5th, 6th and 7th, will be prepared by the National Convention committee meeting here on July 31, and succeeding days, and submitted to the Liberal caucus of Senators and members of parliament which will make the final decision on the night of August 4. So far local committees meeting here have been considering only such problems as are connected with making arrangements suitable for the largest political convention ever held in Canada.

Already two-thirds of the delegates have been elected in the various federal districts, and it is now evident that 1,800 delegates will be here. There will be three delegates and three alternates from each constituency, as well as Liberal members and Senators, defeated Liberal candidates in the last Federal election.

Committee rooms for the various provincial units will be provided, so that they can easily prepare resolutions and take decisions.

trip to Great Britain this week—or such was his program when parliament prorogued—and it was not his intention to remain in the cabinet on his return. Hon. Frank Carvell has been on point of retiring for months and his departure is certain. Reconstruction is a big job.

If the premier had the courage to face public opinion he could lay his hand on a man who probably cannot be matched in all-around ability in Canada. Sir Joseph Flavelle would be of enormous strength to any cabinet were it not for the fact that he has made a great deal of money out of a common food product, the high price of which has made it a synonym for profiteering in the mind of the people. As a matter of fact, all the evidence is that the profits per pound of the company with which Sir Joseph Flavelle is connected, were merely fractional.

Prejudice will probably lose to the state the advantage of this man's unique business and organizing ability. As Minister of Trade and Commerce, Sir Joseph Flavelle would be worth a million a year salary to Canada at this time.

COMPENSATION FOR ARREST AND INJURIES

Seoul, Korea, July 15 The government of Korea has paid to the British consulate the equivalent of \$2,500 in compensation for injuries received by the Rev. John Thomas in connection with the Korean independence movement.

Although a British subject Mr. Thomas is representative here of the Oriental Mission Society which has its headquarters in Chicago. He was arrested at Kokei Korea, March 20 and was beaten by Japanese civilians and struck by a policeman.

In the criminal court here four Japanese civilians concerned in the attack were fined and the policeman whom Mr. Thomas charged with assault was punished by disciplinary measures.

Mr. Thomas declared that he was arrested without provocation, kicked and beaten. The police seemed to think he was an American, he said, and would not allow him to substantiate his claim to British citizenship nor to show his papers. Finally at the police station the matter was arranged. The police admitted they had made a mistake and expressed their regrets.
