## SOME NEW POINTS.

Admiral Sir Percy Scott, the distinguished British naval officer, whose prophecy of the development of the submarine as a more deadly instrument of warfare than the battleship has been so strikingly fulfilled during the war at sea, has compiled a new series of "Fourteen Points" which, he contends, the whole civilized world will accept, when they review the peace terms which Sir Percy Scott adjudges fair and equitable. His indictment is:

1. That the Germans deliberately brought about the war.
2. That all the statements made by the Kaiser and his high officials to the effect that the war was forced on them were lies.
3. That in the future neither the words nor the signatures of Germans can be trusted.
4. That as regards the German national character, the war showed that when victorious against Belgium they conducted war on ruthless, remorseless and relentless principles, and committed every crime that savagery can compass.
5. That they were encouraged in these crimes by their officers and high officials.
6. That as liars, from the Kaiser downward they are unparalleled; they lied to their own nation; they lied to their allies; they lied to the world.
7. As thieves and wanton destroyers of property they have outdone the savage race of Huns that they are descended from; their wholesale thieving was not the acts of individuals, it was organized and controlled by high officials.
8. That in defeat their true character is revealed; it is despicable, for they are now squealing like whipped curs.
9. That the statement made by Hun officials to the effect that they could have carried the war to a victorious end, but that internal trouble forced them to ask for an armistice, is a lie.
10. That in the war the Huns were fairly and thoroughly beaten on the sea, under the sea, on the land and in the air.
11. That the war has practically been a triumph of civilization over barbarism.
12. That probably the most contemptible character of the war was the man known as Kaiser Wilhelm II; he sanctioned the crimes committed by his barbaric subjects, he lied to his army and to his people, his speeches were mostly blasphemous.
13. The Kaiser prolonged the war and the consequent shedding of blood for three years, for he knew that he was beaten at the Marne.
14. When, in November, 1918, the end had come, the Kaiser, instead of facing it like an emperor and a man, ran away.

Their last act in sinking the ships at Scapa Flow, the famous Admiral naturally and truly says, teaches the world that the Huns have no honor, and that the world has been foolish in treating them as a civilized race; they are barbarians.

Coinciding with his return from a fishing trip with Senator Thorne, comes the announcement that Sir

Douglas Hazen will reenter the Dominion cabinet as Minister of Justice. Upon the formation of Union Government, Sir Douglas (then plain J. D. Hazen) went out of public life rather unexpectedly and it is said is anxious for an opportunity to finish his work. Should he return to political life, the knowing ones say that Hon. A. S. White, the senior puisne judge, will become Chief Justice, and that the vacancy will go either to ex-Attorney General Baxter or Mr. M. G. Teed, K. C.

Hon. Mr. Carvell is slated to quit the Union cabinet some time during the present month, and some Tory papers are indulging in speculation in regard to his future. It is scarcely likely that the Minister is doing much worrying himself along that line. He is one of the ablest and most useful men in the public life of Canada, and if the country does not need his valuable services at the present time the day will surely soon come when it will. In the meantime Hon. Mr. Carvell will be quite able to take care of himself in any situation that might arise.

Toronto Star: President Wilson is more closely criticized on every word he speaks or writes than perhaps any other man of his day. He comes through it very well, considering the severity of the test—he comes through it better than most would. In the election of 1910 Lord Charles Beresford was taken severely to task for some entirely unwarranted statement he had made in a speech to his constituents. "Well," he replied, "a fellow has got to say something if he wants to be elected."

The Militia Department has been advised that the troopship Royal George, with 909 Canadian soldiers on board, as well as eight dependents, will reach Halifax on or about the 20th. She carries 98 officers, 485 other ranks and 326 patients. The patients, it is stated, are advanced convalescents. Among those on board, three officers and two other ranks are for the Charlottetown dispersal area, and four officers and 189 other ranks for Halifax.

A Pittsburg despatch says that the U. S. government won its first point yesterday in its fight against the sale of beer containing 2.75 per cent alcohol, when Judge W. P. Stghm, in the United States District Court, overruled demurrers of officers and directors of the Pittsburg and Independent brewing companies to charges of violation of the war time prohibition law. Each of the defendants, nineteen in all, was held in \$1,000 bail for the November term of court.

Fredericton will celebrate the signing of the peace treaty and the Allied victory on Saturday next, and it is the duty of all citizens to unite in making the celebration one worthy of the capital city of New Brunswick. A big program is being arranged and should be the means of attracting many visitors to the city.

Ex-Councillor David Carson had a narrow escape from death one day last week, when he fell from the staging of a house on which he was working at Prince William. He suffered several broken ribs and will be confined to his home for some time.

Dr. Melvin was the retiring president of the society. In his address to the society he referred to the influenza epidemic and also to the death of two valued members of the society, Dr. P. R. Inches and Dr. Michaud.

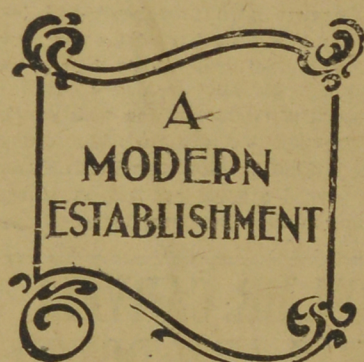
