At 9.30 o'clock this morning a still alarm was sent in from the home of Mr. Pond, in the Edgcombe Building, on King Street. Some bedding had caught fire and the flames had spread to the hangings around the windows and also the woodwork. It was soon extinguished without much damage.

Two Year's Sentence

Thomas Wheeler and James Bradley, who were detained by the St. John police Monday evening on instructions from the police at McAdam Junction, were taken before the police magistrate at St. John yesterday afternoon. They were charged with importing stolen goods into the province. They pleaded guilty and were sentenced to two years in Dorchester. The evidence showed that these two had broken into a box car on a siding in Maine and had stolen goods. It was said that the men then came across the border and got into a section man's shanty and changed their clothing for workmen's garments. They came to St. John and were arrested here for not giving a satisfactory account of themselves and acting suspiciously. They were before the police magistrate on Monday and allowed to go in order to secure work at Courtenay Bay. Soon after their release word was received from the McAdam police asking that they be held.

GENERAL RAIN DOES MUCH GOOD FOR FARMERS

**HAYING INTERRUPTED
IN SOME SECTIONS**

Grain in Fine Condition---Potatoes Promise Well---Co-operative Marketing of Lambs.

The steady rain which began last night and which continued all today is reported by the Department of Agriculture to be quite general throughout the province. The rain will be of enormous benefit to the farming districts as the recent rains although doing much good, were not sufficiently heavy. Haying operations in some sections however will be interrupted by the rain.

The weekly report issued by the Department and based on reports received from District Representatives, is as follows:

Grain Improved

Reports from all parts of the province indicate a marked improvement in the appearance of the grain crop since last week. Rains have been fairly general and have been followed by good growing weather. The spring grain has a good color and, although somewhat late, gives promise of a crop well up to the average.

Potatoes Promise Well

The potato crop is also late in many parts of the province, but on the whole the potatoes are growing well. Some excellent fields are seen. Spraying is quite general. It is rather early to make any estimate on the yield but in most parts of the province the crop is quite promising just at present.

Montreal Inquires for Apples

The apple crop is still quite promising. The scab is developing quite badly on some varieties. The fruit is growing well. A representative of a Montreal firm was in the Province during the week and stated that the apple market was likely to be quite strong this year with good prices to the grower.

More Butter and Cheese

Pastures have been remarkably good and are standing well. Cheese factories and creameries generally report receipts of milk and cream in good condition. The make of cheese, butter in the province will be increased by at least ten per cent, according to advices received.

Co-operative Selling of Lambs

Reports on livestock are very favorable. Good pastures have put the stock in good condition. Lambs are growing well. The Chipman Branch of the United Farmers of New Brunswick are planning to sell two or three
