### SHAM HOUSECLEANERS.

Several newspapers have put forward the suggestion that in view of the shocking disclosures made at the potato enquiry the local opposition party should get busy and clean house. The suggestion is an excellent and timely one; but it is not likely to be acted upon, because of the fact that the party as at present constituted would not know how to go about the job.

The government of scandals, which was kicked out of office in February, 1917, was supposed to have cleaned house in the early part of 1915, when Hon. Mr. Flemming went out and Mr. Baxter went in. Mr. Flemming had been convicted by a royal commission of grave irregularities in connection with the timberlands and Valley railway enterprise, but the party housecleaners were so afraid of hurting his feelings that they gave the public to understand that he had resigned the premiership in order that he might be in a position to accept the Federal nomination in Carleton and drive the wicked Mr. Carvell from public life. Not satisfied with this gross attempt at deception, the party at the following session of the Legislature by resolution applied a generous coat of whitewash to the premier and the seconder of the resolution was none other than Mr. George B. Jones, M. P. P., one of the heroes of the potato enquiry. This completed the house-cleaning process.

In a by election in Westmorland which followed the resignation of Hon. John Morrissey from the government in May, 1910, Hon. Dr. Landry Hon. B. F. Smith and other purists went about the country telling the people that Flemming had done wrong but that "the party" had cleaned house. During a by election in Carleton a few months later these men sang a different tune. Smith was then seeking election as minister of public works and he maintained a discreet silence about the house cleaning process which he had boasted of in Westmorland. As a matter of fact he was able to number Flemming among his most active supporters in the campaign. They spoke from the same platform and in all probability slept in the same bed while the campaign was in progress. Aided by the \$5000 boodle fund extracted from the Valley Rwy, Mr. Smith won the election and the government was saved for the time being. In the general election which followed in February 1917, Mr. Flemming attended the party convention at Woodstock and in a speech strongly urged the people to sustain the Murray government. That goes to prove that the housecleaning carried out by the present opposition when it held the reigns of power was a miserable sham. The party lacked the courage to publicly repudiate Flemming and there is little danger of it repudiating the heroes of the potato scandal. The trouble with the opposition party is that it does not seem able to find anybody in its ranks qualified to fire the first stone. In view of its past record the people would be justified in viewing with suspicion any attempts at housecleaning which might be undertaken as a result of the exposure made at the potato enquiry.

### EX-PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT

The unexpected death of ex-President Theodore Roosevelt at his home at Oyster Bay this morning removes from the activities of life a gentleman who has been an outstanding figure in the public life of the great republic for more than twenty years. During that time he successively filled the offices of Governor of New York, Vice-President and President of the United States. He completed President McKinley's term of office after the latter had fallen at the hand of an assassin, and in 1904 was re-elected for a full term. In 1912 he was a third party candidate for President and although defeated by Mr. Wilson, he polled more votes than Mr. Taft, the regular Republican nominee. As a soldier, statesman, journalist, author and explorer, Mr. Roosevelt had a remarkable career, and history will put him down as one of the greatest men of his time. The death in the prime of life of such a forcible and gifted man, will be a great loss to the American nation and will be deplored by English-speaking people and lovers of freedom all over the world.

Toronto News: The tendency in Toronto has been to condemn the Police Commission as autocratic, dictatorial and even militaristic. Some outsiders take a very different view. The Chatham, N. B., World says editorially: "The Toronto Police Commission, being neither fish, flesh nor fowl, nor even good red herring, but only blubber, has coaxed the striking policemen to resume their duties by agreeing to leave the question of a police union to a royal commission. The commission should have enrolled a new force instead of the strikers, choosing returned soldiers for the work. What kind of weak-kneed slobbery stuff is the commission made of?" 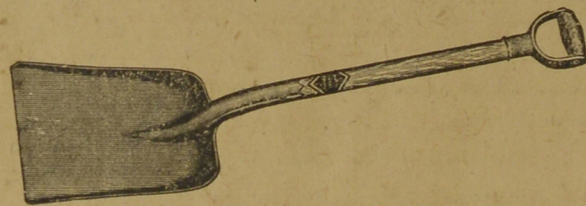
