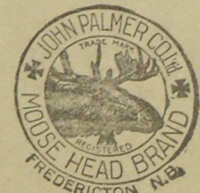

# CANADIAN BOYS TELL OF MARCH INTO GERMANY

Have Respect for Civilian Population But Are Bitter Against  
the German Military Machine—Many Amusing Stories are  
Told—Food was Not so Awfully Scarce, But Chocolate was  
at a Premium—Water Wagon Loaded With Champagne.

(Montreal Star)

Marching into Germany to the furthest point in the armistice line, the boys of the 13th and 14th battalions, the first to come back from the army of occupation, have many interesting impressions of their visit to the enemy's country. Amazing as it may seem, they are not so bitter against the German civilian population as they are against the military machine of that country. The comfortable billets in private homes in Cologne, and then at other towns on the outposts of the armistice line, were very welcome after years in the mud of the trenches.

The boys tell amusing stories of their march into Germany. The battalion went 274 miles into the land of the Hun, to the extreme armistice line. The march began on November 13 and ended on December 14. On arrival at their destination the boys were looked at askance by the German civil population but when they discovered the fine morale and demeanor of the Canadians they became quite friendly. They expressed pleasure on the arrival of the Canadians at Cologne, as there had been rioting the previous day in the city. The public works were well handled in Germany they say and were being operated as under normal conditions and the street car service and lighting was good.

Food did not seem to be very scarce, not scarcer than in England, the officers say, but there was a premium on chocolate. "Chocolate was legal tender in Germany and you could secure anything in exchange for it," said one officer. "They would go almost wild if given a bit of chocolate."

The linen of the country was absolutely exhausted and paper was used exclusively to take the place of it. "Thursday was sauer kraut day in Germany," said an officer, "and when all the people got cooking it smelled as strong as a pulp mill at work. 'I was orderly officer the first in and with the company commander was seeking billets,' said a subaltern. 'We went into one house and at the door a terrific smell greeted our nostrils. Go into that house and see what is wrong there,' ordered the O. C. 'I went into the first room and it was worse so I said to the sergeant major go into the kitchen and see what they are doing.'"

He returned in a few minutes holding his nose and he said, "Sir, there is a stove going full blast in there and three big pots on it, that is all I know sir." It was Thursday and sauer kraut day as we afterwards learned, hence the smell."

The 14th left Germany on January 5 and arrived at Huy in Belgium, from which centre they started and arrived in England on March 5 and were forwarded to Bramshott Camp.

### Abandoned Mascot

It is one of the regrets of the battalion that the mascot a dog called "Flossie" was banned from entry into England and had to be left at Havre. This was a dog that was found during the second battle of Ypres. It was then but a day or two old and the boys who discovered it mothered it, and it grew up to be the pet of the whole brigade. Flossie eventually became a real soldier canine and would have naught to do with anyone in civilian clothes but would gladly make friends with a man in military uniform.

Some of the officers complain of the fact that at Halifax the stevedores refused to unload the baggage from the Carmania on her arrival and went home to have supper before tackling the work, thus delaying the entraining of the battalion over an hour and a half.

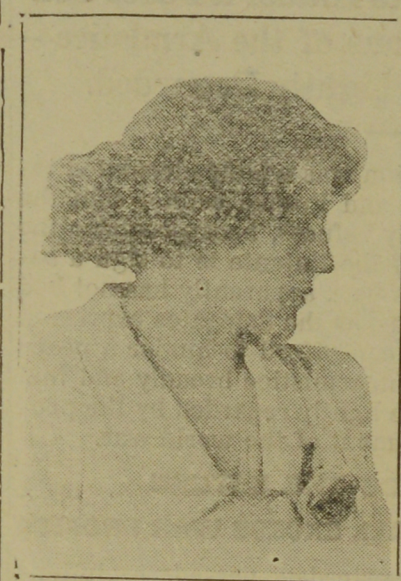
All the boys are happy to be coming home. "The trip back home was the worst part of the war," declared an officer, who added, "I just gave ninety per cent of the men three weeks before they wish they were back in the army again."

### Rare Old Wine

The men say that they had a great time at Arras. There they found large quantities of champagne and red wine of rare old vintage, which had escaped the horrors of the war. For a while there was plenty of liquid refreshment and any champagne not older than five years we would throw aside. One morning I went down with a party to get the watering cart and when we got it back we found that it was full

of champagne and red wine mixed."

There was a French company in the unit and a story is told of a French sergeant who, going along the front line, stuck his head into the mouth of a dug-out and shouted "How many of you are der down dar." "Seven," shouted back the Tommies. "Well, come up half of youse," ordered the sergeant.
