## HOW TO VOTE

The voter shall use the official bal-  
lot and shall strike out the words  
"For Daylight Saving" or the words  
"Against Daylight Saving," in accord-  
ance with his desire to vote against  
or for the same, as the case may be.

Not more than one elector shall at  
any one time enter the polling place,  
and such elector, upon entering, shall  
declare his name, surname and addi-  
tion, and if the name of such elector  
is found on the list of voters, he shall  
receive from the presiding officer an  
unopened envelope, on the back of  
which the presiding officer shall write  
with a pencil of black lead or with pen  
and ink, his initials, in the presence of  
the voter.

The elector, on receiving the envel-  
ope, shall forthwith proceed within  
the screened compartment, and shall  
there, having marked his ballot, or  
having previously done so, replace his  
ballot within the envelope handed to  
him by the presiding officer, and shall,  
without any delay, hand the envelope  
containing his ballot, unopened, to the  
presiding officer, who shall ascertain  
by examining his initials that it is the  
same with which he had furnished the  
voter, and if so satisfied shall immedi-  
ately and in the presence of the voter  
place the envelope containing the bal-  
lot in the ballot box, and the voter  
shall immediately leave the polling  
place. No such ballot shall be received  
by the presiding officer until the  
voter has proceeded to the screened  
compartment within the polling place,  
and while there placed his ballot in  
the envelope furnished him by the  
presiding officer.

The poll clerk shall, under the di-  
rection of the presiding officer, then  
enter the name of the voter on the  
check list.

TO RHUBARB?

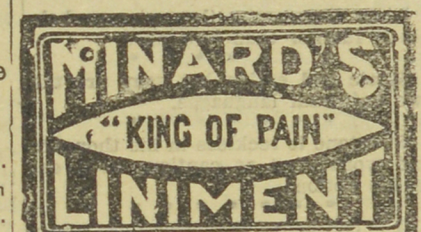
(Indianapolis News.)

It seems that almost anybody or  
anything can have a press agent these  
days. Two of our contemporaries  
print identical tributes to rhubarb on  
the same day. That would indicate  
that rhubarb's publicity representa-  
tive has syndicated his literary ef-  
forts so that several newspapers could  
use them at the same time. Thus he  
says, somewhat after the style of Mr.  
Elmore the poet:

Rhubarb, first of the spring  
Treasures to pop from the  
Child lap of Nature—  
Rhubarb, we adore thee!  
There is something in that of the  
same quality to be found in  
Sassafras, oh sassafras,  
Thou art the stuff for me!  
And in the spring I love to sing,  
Sweet sassafras, of thee.

Poets have sung of roses, eyebrows,  
red lips, peaches, apple jack—and sas-  
safras. There is no reason why one of  
them should not twang his lyre and  
yodel his yearning for rhubarb. In  
conclusion the tribute says:

"The soul of rhubarb is domestic. It  
must be lifted from its bed by the  
housewife, and tenderly undressed and  
carefully embedded in just the right  
sort of crust, and as speedily as pos-  
sible, it must be partaken of before  
the lower crust is soggy, and it must  
have exactly the right touch of sugar.

EXPLOSIONS  
AT LAWRENCE

Lawrence, Mass., April 22.—Two ex-  
plosions, an hour apart, shattered win-  
dows and doors in tenement blocks  
and threw mill workers and their fam-  
ilies into a state of excitement to-  
night. No one was injured. The po-  
lice were unable to find any clue to  
the cause.

The first explosion occurred in an  
eight tenement house, opposite the  
Everett mill. Apparently some sort  
of explosive had been placed under an  
outside stairway at the rear of the  
building. A child in bed was showered  
with glass from a broken window,  
but was unhurt.

An hour later there was a similar  
explosion at a house in South Law-  
rence, two miles away from the scene  
of the first one and near the United  
States Woco Mill. One man was  
knocked down and a door was blown  
over on him, but he escaped injury.

Undressing the soul of rhubarb and  
then tenderly making a pie of it is  
something of a culinary accomplish-  
ment. To speak of the plant as our  
first American fruit leads one into  
the realms of disquisition. A reliable  
book, such as the Encyclopedia Bri-  
tannica—in the Ref to Sai volume—  
says that the name rhubarb is applied  
both to a drug and a vegetable. The  
drug, made from the roots, first came  
into use in China about 2700 B. C.  
Since then it has crossed into Asia  
and Europe, and is widely known. The  
Rheum raphaniticum and its varieties  
are generally known in this country  
as "pie plant," where the leaf stalks  
are used for sauce and pies. Whether  
it is a fruit, a bower or a vegetable,  
it makes a wholly attractive pie, and  
a soggy undercrust seems to do it no  
harm. The tribute is well deserved.
