

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## OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

### THRIFT IN USING FATS.

All Housewives Should Get the Habit of Saving Scraps of Fat That are Trimmed from Meat.

Thrift in using fats means wasting none. It means making the least amount go the longest way. Above all, it means saving every scrap of fat that comes into the kitchen in the form of trimmings from meat and suet.

Careful housekeepers have always saved these fats and prepared them for cooking. If all would form this thrifty habit not only would America have no need to fear a fat shortage, but other countries could be amply supplied from our stores.

In rendering fats for cooking, the following things are useful to know: Grind the fat if necessary and soak it for several hours in water that has one teaspoonful of salt to every quart. Drain off the water and try out the fat in the top of a double boiler over water. Then strain through a fine wire strainer or cloth and store in covered vessels in a cool place.

To deodorize fats, grind and soak them in salt water (one teaspoon of salt to every quart of water). Then to every pound of fat add one-half cup of sour milk, preferably clabbered.

This will not only deodorize the fat, but clarify it also. If necessary, try out the fat or heat it thoroughly in a double boiler, strain and after cooling remove the fat from the liquid.

### BACKGROUNDS.

Every woman's home is her background, and as such it should create an atmosphere for her, not make such a bid for attention that it obscures her. In this connection it is interesting to note that one of the primary rules of interior decorations as it is taught in art schools is that "any article must be more intense than the background on which it appears."

The backgrounds that lend themselves best to our modern American homes are light—for light colors are more informal—and rather dull than vivid, for comfort and repose must be suggested. Personal taste can dictate the final choice between colors after these factors have been considered, but expense has proved that the best selection is tan, dull green or gray blue.

### HOW TO PACK A COAT.

It is hard to pack a coat. Turn back the sleeves at the elbow over a roll of tissue paper and pin them in place. Lay several crumpled sheets of tissue paper inside the coat and bring one side far over the other—over the tissue paper too. Then wrap the coat in several sheets of paper and pack tight.

### RANDOM REMINDERS.

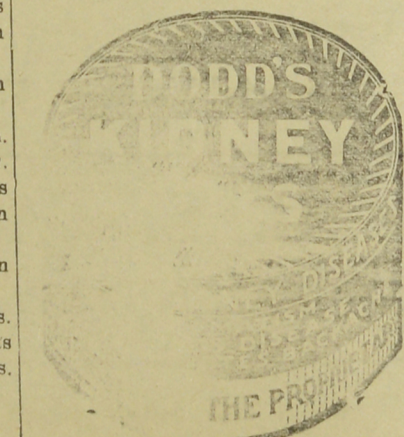
When you soak your clothes put in one cupful of ammonia. It will quickly loosen the dirt.

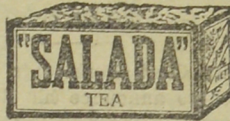

## SOME EXTRACTS FROM REPORT OF COMMISSIONER McQUEEN

In tenders were called for, but names of certain persons were selected, and these given a preference over all others. The names disclosed are the persons referred to.

Within this circle still another preference was extended, this time to the Hon. B. F. Smith, afterward Minister of Public Works in the late Government, and one of the present Members for the County of Carleton; this privilege never should have been granted, was shamefully abused, and is one of the chief causes for the loss sustained.

The balance of these potatoes were not accounted for, and outside of the culls, which were traced to some extent, appear to be a total loss to the Province. A large number of these were sold by Mr. Daggett to parties in St. John and were never credited to the Province. These he should be made to account for.

The returns for the potatoes so sold (amounting to \$8,499.46) never passed through the books of any of the Departments of the Province. This amount was swallowed up in the expenditures and an attempt made to induce the public to believe that at least \$32,861.39 had been received by the Province on account of such sales.

The arrangement made with Tennant by which this money was to be taken out of the Province as disclosed, is one which the late Government never should have consented or agreed to and is censurable from every standpoint, as it was obtained by Tennant under an illegal agreement and paid by him for an illegal and improper purpose, and should be returned to the Province.

Certain statements made by Geo. B. Jones under oath on the Stevens' inquiry were in direct contradiction to those made by him on this inquiry and the sworn evidence given by him on the Stevens' inquiry that he had no knowledge of what became of the \$40,000 in cash which Tennant took out of the bank as part of the proceeds of a cheque for \$100,000, was false and untrue.

The Hon. B. F. Smith was advanced by the late Government \$2,375.70 on the purchase of potatoes which the Province never received.

The late Minister of Agriculture, the Hon. J. A. Murray, borrowed money from A. C. Smith & Co., contractors with his Department during the time the shipping and handling of these potatoes were being carried on, and this loan is so mixed up with the public business of the Province that I am unable to report whether the \$1,500 returned to Smith was this private loan or money which belonged to the Province.
