

## ELEVEN IN THE GRADUATING CLASS AT U.N.B.

A. Clarence Edgecombe, Valedictorian—An Address in Praise of Founders to be Delivered.

At the annual encaenia to be held Thursday May 15th, the University of New Brunswick will graduate a class of eleven members. The class is a small one the war having reduced the membership of all classes, but it is larger than was expected at the beginning of the year as four returned soldiers joined it during the year. The class will contain one engineer, five foresters and five Arts students. Of the latter two are young ladies. The returned soldiers are A. Clarence Edgecombe, Brydone Millidge, Gustav Kuhring and J. Miles Gibson.

### Encaenia Addresses

A. Clarence Edgecombe has been selected as valedictorian by the graduating class. The Faculty Address which is formally known as the Address in Praise of the Founders will be delivered by Prof. Adam Cameron, professor of chemistry. The Alumni Orator is to be Dr. Fraser Harris of the Faculty of Medicine at Dalhousie University, Halifax, the announcement being made today by Mr. A. S. McFarlane, president of the Associated Alumni.

Other features of the encaenia proceedings will be announced later.

## LABOR COUNCIL TO PROTEST TO CITY COUNCIL

WANTS MAYOR'S DAYLIGHT  
SAVING ORDER RECALLED

Largely Attended Meeting Held Last Night—Provincial Government to be Asked to Interfere.

Last evening a mass meeting of labor men was called at the Union Hall, Regent Street, by the Fredericton Labor Council for the purpose of protesting against the adoption of Daylight Saving time in this city. The meeting was well attended about two hundred turning out to it. The surrounding places were well represented at the meeting people coming from Devon and Marysville to attend it.

President Harry Ryan was in the chair. A delegation of ten men was appointed to wait on the City Council at its special meeting on Thursday evening and demand that the action of Mayor Hanson in proclaiming the adoption of the new time be rescinded. A resolution was also drawn up to be presented to the Provincial Government protesting against the adoption of Daylight Saving Time in this city. Considerable discussion took place over the action to be taken and on a vote being taken among those assembled the meeting was unanimously opposed to the Daylight Saving. President Ryan asked the Mail this morning to deny reports current that the delegation waiting on the City Council would ask for the resignation of the Mayor.

### Victoria Mill Starts

The Victoria Mill owned by the Fraser Companies Ltd., started operations this morning. About ninety men are employed at the mill which will run until autumn.

### New Brunswick Wheat

Mr. Donald Fraser of Fraser Companies Ltd., Plaster Rock, is among the visitors to the city today. Mr. Fraser in addition to his lumbering business carries on extensive farming operations at Plaster Rock. Last season he produced two thousand bushels of high grade wheat. He had it ground into flour at the mill at Bristol, Carleton County. The output amounted to about 350 barrels. Its superior quality was attested by the fact that it found a ready sale when placed alongside of such high class brands as Five Roses.

## BILLS THROUGH MUNICIPALITIES COMMITTEE

EDMUNDSTON BILL RE  
FRASER ASSESSMENT

St. Stephen Permanent Paving Bill Opposed by Street Railway Company—Lancaster Bill.

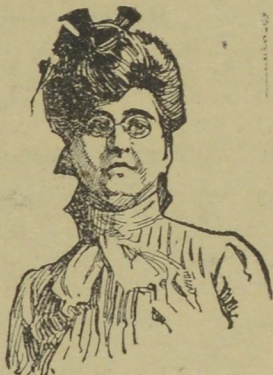
The Committee on Municipalities met this morning and took up consideration of the bill relating to police district in the Parish of Lancaster which was agreed to with amendments. The Committee also considered the bill to authorize the Town of St. Stephen to issue debentures for permanent streets. Mayor Johnson and Councillor Budd of St. Stephen and N. Marks Mills, Solicitor of the same Town appeared in support of the bill with F. M. Clark, Civil Engineer, who gave expert testimony. B. Y. Curran of Calais, Maine representing the Street Railway Company appeared in opposition to that portion of the bill requiring the Company to pay 20 per cent of the cost on streets in which its tracks were laid. Messrs. Mills, Curran and Clark were heard by Committee which took the bill into further consideration in private session and decided to recommend it.

The Committee again considered the bill relating to the assessment of Fraser Ltd. in the Town of Edmundston. A new bill drafted by representatives of Fraser Ltd. and the Edmundston School Board was presented to the Committee. Under the provisions of this bill valuation for purposes of school assessment of the property of Fraser Ltd. was placed at \$500,000 between the years 1918-1942 both inclusive, and not applying to 60 per cent of the actual cost of dwellings and other property. For 1918 the valuation for school assessment was placed at \$250,000. R. B. Hanson appeared with Messrs. Archibald and Donald Fraser on behalf of the Company and Max D. Cormier on behalf of the School Board. The bill was recommended.

### The Tug Hero

Capt. Garrity of Devon is mourning the loss of the river tug Hero recently sunk at her berth in St. John. The Hero was "the oldest craft on the line" having been in commission for nearly forty years. Capt. Garrity has been in command of her for thirty years. So far he has not succeeded in getting another boat.

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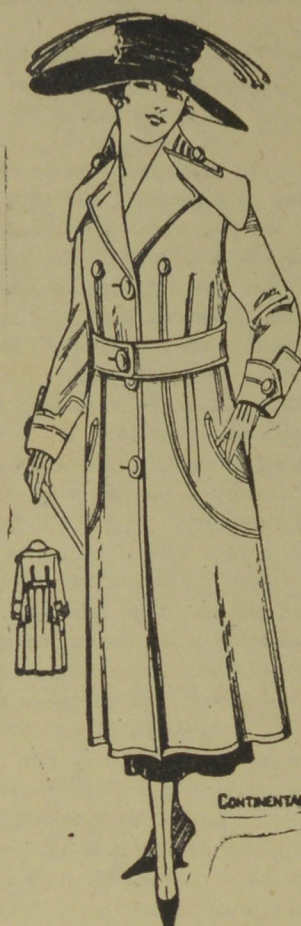
