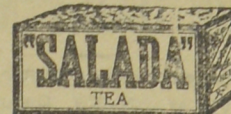

SEVERAL IMPORTANT BILLS
BEFORE THE LEGISLATURE

(Continued from Page Two)

both ways. Why should Moncton
wholesalers who continually were
seeking business outside the City, not
be required to pay taxes in Municipal-
ities outside the City? Double taxa-
tion of this nature should not be per-
mitted to exist in any place in this pro-
vince and the Legislature should take
steps to remove any such powers. As
far as he could see the City of St.
John was in the same position. He
considered such double taxation an
encroachment on individual liberties.
As far as Moncton was concerned
there were many residents of the City
who earned their living outside.

MR. TILLEY said that newspapers
had reported him as opposing the Sec-
tion. He had not opposed it but had
expressed the opinion that non-resi-
dents earning incomes in Moncton
should pay a proportionate assessment
on those incomes, as in St. John where
half of such incomes were taxed.

MR. SWEENEY said that published
reports of the proceedings of the com-
mittee on Municipalities appeared to
show that only members of the oppo-
sition had opposed the Section, which
was not correct. He had expressed
himself as against the section.

MR. POTTS asked if the act relating
to the City of Moncton was intended
to license auctioneers.

MR. BURCHILL said he could not
see why it did not as auctioneers dealt
in junk, old metals and second hand
articles.

HON. MR. ROBINSON said it was
not the intention to license auction-
eers under this act.

The bills were reported and House
again went into committee with Mr.
King in the chair, and agreed with
amendments to a bill to charge the
name of the Home of Aged Females in
the City of St. John to the Old Ladies'
Home of St. John; to a bill to incor-
porate the Redemptorist Fathers of
New Brunswick; to a bill to authorize
the Municipality of Victoria County
to make temporary loans for Board of
Health purposes; to a bill to amend an
act relating to the Calais Water and
Power Co.; to a bill authorizing the
City of Fredericton to issue debentures
for permanent streets and side-
walks.

MR. GRIMMER, speaking to the bill
relating to the Calais Water and Power
Company, said that before the Cor-
porations Committee opposition to the
bill had been experienced from the
Town of Milltown. A conference be-
tween the opposing parties had been
held and an agreement reached and an
amendment was ready to be placed be-
fore the committee. The amendment
was read and adopted.

The bills were reported and House
again went into committee with Mr.
Sutton in the chair, and agreed with
amendments to a bill relating to the
assessment and collecting of taxes in
the Town of Shediac; a bill to amend
the act incorporating the Primitive
Baptist Denomination of New Brun-
swick; a bill to authorize the Municipal-
ity of Victoria to exempt flour or grist
mills from taxation.

HON. MR. TWEEDDALE explained that
the bill relating to the Primitive
Baptist Denomination was required to
enable people to bequeath property to
the denomination which under the act
of incorporation had no central author-
ity.

HON. MR. VENIOT, speaking to the
bill to exempt flour or grist mills from
taxation said he would not let the bill
go through without stipulations that
school taxes were not exempt.

HON. MR. TWEEDDALE said that the
bill had originated in the Municipal
Council of Victoria county. In
certain quarters he had been repre-
sented as father of the bill, but such
was not correct, and he had introduced
it merely as the representative of
that county. Exemption of school
taxation was a matter for the com-
mittee to decide. He had no objec-
tion to a amendment stipulating that
school taxes should not be exempt.

Such an amendment was adopted.
MR. BAXTER in speaking to a bill
respecting the division of the province
into counties, towns and parishes,
drew attention to the fact that two
bills with the same title and for sim-
ilar purposes had been introduced and
could well be combined.

MR. BURCHILL objected that one
of these bills relating to Northumber-
land county was to be before the
Municipalities Committee Wednesday
morning, and was improperly before
the committee of the whole House.

HON. MR. POSTER pointed out that
the bill was not on the order paper
and could not go before the com-
mittee. A slight error had been made.

MR. BAXTER pressed his sugges-
tion to combine the two bills.
HON. MR. DUGAL made a motion to
report progress in order that the com-
bination might be effected.

The bills were reported and the

House went into committee with Mr.
Leger (Westmorland) in the chair,
and took up consideration of a bill to
amend the Audit Act.

The Audit Act.

MR. BAXTER asked if it was in-
tended that cheques should be signed
by the Comptroller General alone and
by no other person, and if such was
right.

HON. MR. MURRAY said that such
was the intention. Under various gov-
ernments for years past there had been
complaint concerning delay in issu-
ing of cheques. It was a laborious
process to have both the Comptroller
General and Deputy Provincial Treas-
urer sign every cheque and it was
sought to do away with some of this
labor and at the same time provide
every safeguard. Heretofore, when
the deputy treasurer found it neces-
sary to be out of the office on busi-
ness for several days at a time that
official signed cheques in advance.
That was no safeguard but this bill
attempted to provide every safeguard.
The system of having but one official
sign cheques obtained in other bodies,
notably municipal councils. The De-
partment wanted to avoid employing
another clerk. As a matter of fact,
there was greater danger connected
with the receipt of money than with
the issuing of cheques. In spite of in-
structions, money frequently was sent
to departments other than that of the
Provincial Treasurer.

MR. YOUNG asked who would sign
cheques in the case of a long illness
of the Comptroller General?

HON. MR. ROBINSON said he be-
lieved that the lithographed signature
of the Provincial Secretary would still
go on the cheques, but under the pro-
visions of the bill only the signature
of the Comptroller General could go
on.

MR. BAXTER agreed with the re-
marks of the Hon. Provincial Secre-
tary. It was impossible to obtain ab-
solute safeguards. He did not intend
to reflect upon the gentleman at pre-
sent occupying the office of Comptrol-
ler General, but it frequently was the
experience that the most trusted offi-
cials failed. The City of St. John had
found that and had been compelled to
take certain steps. This legislation
would put the province in such a po-
sition that some person might get hold
of a blank cheque with the signature
on it. The lithographed signature of
the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer
was no protection. It all came down
to the Comptroller General and really
was an abandonment of checking of
any kind. It was not good business.

HON. MR. POSTER said it was true
in provincial business as in others that
it was the system of issuing cheques
and their audit which insured safety
and not the signature which was on
the cheques. His hon. friend (Bax-
ter) would find that many large cor-
porations employed lithographed sig-
natures on their cheques. He recently
had noticed two, the Bank of Nova
Scotia and the Dominion Coal Co.

MR. BAXTER asked what would be
done if the Comptroller General fell
ill. He did not think there was any
provision in the Audit Act.

HON. MR. POSTER said he thought
there was a provision in it.

HON. MR. VENIOT said if this bill
would facilitate the issuing of cheques
it should be allowed to go through.
His department was the largest spend-
ing department in the government,
and frequently found it impossible to
issue cheques promptly in payment of
work already done.

MR. BAXTER said that if two men
could not sign cheques fast enough,
one could not.

HON. MR. MURRAY quoted section
11 of the Audit Act to the effect that
the Governor-in-Council could appoint
an acting Comptroller General in the
event of the illness of the Comptroller
General.

It being six o'clock the chairman left
the chair, to resume at 8.

HON. MR. MURRAY on the Com-
mittee resuming after recess, said he
had looked over the Audit Act and had
found that the section which empow-
ered the Governor-in-Council to ap-
point an acting Comptroller General
covered the point that had been raised.
In reference to the criticism that
the use of a lithographed signature
on a cheque was not authorized, he
wished to say that it was a mere mat-
ter of form. The placing of the date
on the cheque was not authorized, yet
it had to be done, and a coat of arms
could be put on if necessary.

MR. MURRAY (Kings) said the
system of having cheques signed by
one individual did not appeal to him.
Large corporations did not follow that
plan, and he did not think it was best
in the interests of the province. He
was casting no reflections on the
Comptroller General when he expressed
the opinion that there should be
two signatures on every cheque. In
