PRINCE CAPTIVATES ALL AT ROTHESAY GARDEN PARTY

Nearly Two Thousand Invited Guests are Presented to Prince of Wales and by His Own Request None are Omitted—Eager to Dance, but Music Stopped All Too Soon—Mrs. Pugsley a Charming Hostess.

Rothsay, Aug. 15.—At the garden party given by the Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. Pugsley of Government House, Rothsay, His Royal Highness enthroned himself forever in the hearts of such loyal subjects of the province as were present. His boyish good humor and cheery courtesy never for a minute faltered. Though the members of his staff were deeply concerned at the personal fatigue he was enduring in the last event of a strenuous day, he would not hear of refusing to shake hands with any of the eighteen hundred guests who attended the party undeterred by doubtful weather conditions. Having greeted them one and all on the charmingly arranged verandah he passed through their throngs to partake of refreshments in the tent upon the lawn and afterwards spent a few all too brief moments dancing to the strains of the excellent music provided by the St. John G. W. V. A. band and then, as he had come, left amid the prolonged and lusty cheering of the guests that clustered till the last moment as closely as possible about him.

The garden party, the last of the many functions which His Royal Highness attended yesterday was indeed a brilliant and thoroughly delightful social event. If the sun could not be persuaded to shine no heavy rain created distress among the guests upon the lawns while the presentations were being made and when the prince had descended for refreshments and while he was enjoying the dancing, the heavy clouds drifted away. It is doubtful if any one noticed the weather while the prince was there. He brought his own sunshine with him.

No more beautiful setting for the royal garden party could have been imagined than the spacious velvet lawns with the towering trees in perfect foliage and the fine residence with its beautifully appointed rooms opening one from the other so conveniently. The gowns of the ladies were creations of rare charm and added bright notes of color to those made by the tastefully arranged floral decorations while the naval and military uniforms in which the majority of the gentlemen appeared gave an added variety of color. The attendance was little if any lessened by adverse weather.

The Prince Arrives
The special train had already brought its gaily gowned passengers and the lawns were well filled when the royal party arrived. A warning whistle told of the approach of the prince and there was a noticeable hush as his car appeared round the corner of the residence then, doubly impressive from the silence which preceded it, heartiest cheers rose from all the gathering while the stirring music of the National Anthem was heard and as he stepped from the car to the fern and palm-bordered entrance, the New Brunswick flag was lowered from the flagstaff above him and the Royal Standard floated on the breeze, telling far and wide that a representative of the reigning house was an honored visitor. Special respect was also shown His Excellency, the Governor General, in the cheering which greeted his arrival.

A shy and nervous boy in manner, he chatted simply and unaffectedly with those in the library, and afterwards was introduced to some of those gathered in the drawing room and hall.

Eager to Dance

While he was being served with refreshments standing at the buffet in the tent His Royal Highness talked with the Government House party and with Premier and Mrs. Foster. When it was suggested to him that a dancing pavilion was awaiting his pleasure he showed eagerness to commence this, his favorite pastime. There was some little delay in starting the music for the dance as the band was being served with refreshments. His Royal Highness appreciated the humor of the incident, and said that he had often danced to the gramophone music suggested as a substitute by Mrs. Pugsley. The band having been rounded up and tuned up in fine style the Prince led off the dance with his hostess, Mrs. William Pugsley, to a seductive waltz tune. Gradually more and more couples took courage and joined in the enjoyment, till during the second and last dance the small pavilion had all of the gayly dancing couples that it would conveniently accommodate. Not for long did the terpsichorean pleasures endure. An encore was given to the second dance, a fox trot for which Mrs. William Pugsley, junior, had the honor of being the partner of the royal guest. The Prince of Wales showed himself no novice in the art of dancing and he and his partners were admirably suited. Another amusing incident occurred before the band had returned when no partners seemed to be forthcoming, and Mrs. Pugsley said to her distinguished guest that she would be extremely sorry to have him await a partner and then have none to present.

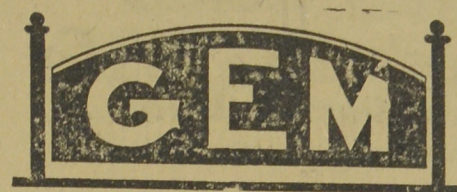
BIG WEEK END MARKET
