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THE SOVIET GOVERNMENT OF RUSSIA HAS NOT YET AGREED TO AN ARMISTICE WITH POLAND

NO REPLY MADE TO THE ALLIES' REQUEST

Message was Forwarded by Wireless to the Soviet Authorities Through the British Government-The Poles Say They Can Put a Big Army in the Field-Minsk Taken.
