## SUNBURY COUNTY DIVORCE CASE HEARD BEFORE JUDGE CROCKET TUESDAY AFTERNOON; OTHER CASES

Application to Amend Libel in Case of Kincaide vs. Kincaide—

Corroboratory Evidence in Coburn vs. Coburn Desirable—

Witness Told of Motoring Trip—Guilt Taken as Proven in

McCavour vs. McCavour—Two Cases at Foot of Docket.

In the Divorce Court Tuesday afternoon the case of Stewart Henry K. Kincaide vs. Gertrude Kincaide was resumed. His Honor Judge Crocket pointed out that the evidence of Mrs. William H. Saunders relative to the defendant giving birth to a child June 3rd, 1915, was the only evidence which could be taken as relating at all to Joseph Poirier, named as co-respondent, with the exception of the fact that the defendant called herself Mrs. Poirier. There was a question as to whether or not the plaintiff himself was responsible for his wife's infidelity, as he made no effort to learn conditions even after being told that she had given birth to children.

G. E. Logan also appeared in the out that the man was a laborer and saved sufficient money to institute divorce proceedings only after some time. Counsel asked for leave to amend the libel so as to charge adultery with a person or with persons unknown or with one Patrick Hachey. Court considers.

The plaintiff taking the stand told of his marriage and said that since April 1917 he and his wife had been living apart. Plaintiff cared for their child. In 1917 he went to Montana with his wife's consent and corresponded with her. Four months later he returned to St. John where he learned that his wife had been keeping company with other men. They had words about this. She admitted it and three days later went to live with her mother. Still later she went to the United States. In September 1919 plaintiff visited her in Boston and found her living with Charles Bedell in Astor street in that city, with two children of which she said Bedell was the father.

Mrs. Eliza Shaw mother of the defendant corroborated the evidence of the plaintiff and told of the defendant giving birth to two children in Boston.

His Honor said that he had no doubt of guilt. Court considers.

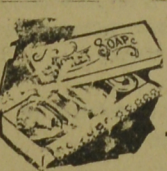
**Coburn vs. Coburn**

Mrs. Leticia McWilliam wife of Alfred McWilliam, sister of the defendant corroborated the particulars of the marriage.

Charles Lonergan rotary lawyer for the Coburn Lumber Company at Ripples swore that he knew both plaintiff and defendant in this action. He also knew Julie Jacquette, a Belgian girl now resident at Minto who is co-respondent in the case. Witness told of a motor trip taken by the defendant.

## MEDIUMS ARE THE DEVIL'S AIDS

New York, Jan. 28—The Rev. Dr. John Roach Straton pastor of Calvary Baptist Church in his sermon Sunday paid his respect to spiritualism in no uncertain terms. He said:

"Sir Oliver Lodge and scientists associated with him are teaching not only that to communicate with those in this world, but that such communications have occurred. The 'facts' upon which they base their inductions however are so flimsy and were secured under such abnormal and artificial conditions as to lead the lay mind to an absolute scepticism about the whole thing.

"Think of sedate scientists sitting in dark rooms having their heads tapped by toy balloons and actually trying to get flashlight pictures of supposed spirits and listening to table rappings and all of it under the direction of women, so-called 'mediums' some of them women of the most ignorant type.

"Some departed spirits have reported that there is plenty of wine and other drinks over there. This certainly is dangerous doctrine for New York at the present time, because it may result in an epidemic of suicides to get over there where the drink are.

The preacher pointed out that mediums were generally women and went on to say that a woman was the medium used by the devil for the overthrow of mankind.

## TO REORGANIZE 71ST REGT. ON FOUR-CO. BASIS

(Continued From Page One.)

**Overseas O. C.**

It is expected that an officer who served overseas will be gazetted as commanding the 71st Lt. Col. W. H. Gray of Maryville whose tenure of command will expire May 1st next, will be given his rank on retirement. Major W. H. Laughlin is the next in seniority. Col. Gray has given much of his time and energy to the regiment since boyhood when he enlisted in the ranks. Disabilities prevented him from serving overseas but on home service he performed valuable duties. He probably will go on the reserve as lieutenant colonel.

**Scale of Pay Unknown.**

The scale of pay is not yet known. This is a most important matter. Prior to the war the pay for a first-class private who qualified in musketry was one dollar per day. Overseas pay was \$1.10 per day. It is believed that the overseas rate will be approximated.

**Disposition of Officers.**

Already officers have been communicated with in order to have them state their intentions with regard to staying in the active militia, going on the corps reserve or the reserve of officers. The company establishments will call for four majors, four captains sixteen lieutenants. The staff will be in addition.

**General MacDonell.**

Brigadier A. H. MacDonell, G. O. C. Military District No. 7 accompanied by Lt. Col. H. C. Sparling, G. S. O., attended a meeting of the officers of the 71st at the Barker House yesterday afternoon. Each officer expressed his private view on the matter of the O. C. being an officer with overseas service. Afterward General MacDonell who is well known in Fredericton having served here as a subaltern in the Royal Canadian Regiment, addressed the assembled officers. He congratulated the regiment upon having the largest attendance of officers of any corps which he yet had visited. He informed them that three matters of chief interest formed the object of his visit—the matter of an officer commanding, the basis of reorganization, four or eight companies, and the rate of pay. The expression of opinion which followed was favorable to a four-company basis and to overseas rates of pay.

General MacDonell continued, announcing that complete overseas uniform equipment and arms would be issued and that a grant of three hundred dollars would be given by the Militia Department to replace mess equipment which had been lost or damaged.

**No Permanent Adjutant.**

Asked if there would be a permanent adjutant of the regiment, the General said that only city corps so far had been given permanent adjutants.
