MIRACLE PICTURE SEEN BY PEOPLE IN MISSOURI CO.

Strange Incident Reported at a Farm House—Photograph of Departed Woman and Child Outlined on the Ceiling—People from All Parts of the Country Have Flocked to See the Weird Phenomenon.

Kansas City, Jan. 24—Two farmhands walked into the little village of Princeton, Mercer County, Missouri one Saturday night in December and told a story of a "miracle" that had happened out at Morgan Donelson's farm, six miles north of town, the night before. Morgan had been sitting in the living room reading his Bible when suddenly the ceiling opened and his dead wife and baby came down out of the sky. Strange voices had spoken Donelson's mother had seen a white finger trace certain outlines on the ceiling and when the apparition vanished there was a queer little design left in the smoke and dust above the gas lamp. It was a picture of the dead wife and her little baby had just lain down together in the coffin on October 6 before the undertaker buried them.

The farmhands had seen the picture with their own eyes. Morgan Donelson had pointed it out to them in broad daylight. It was about three inches long and not quite as wide. It looked like the negative of a photograph. You could see the parting in Mrs. Donelson's hair and the outlines of her arms folded across her breast. And the little baby at her side.

A Rock Island freight train stopped on a siding a mile away and the whole crew—engineer, fireman, brakeman and conductor—walked across the fields to the farmhouse and trooped into the living room. A stranger came to the house on Tuesday afternoon and taking Donelson to one side told him of a dream in which it was revealed that the picture was the work of the devil. Donelson listened and became alarmed. He got his Bible and asked all the people in the room to kneel down with him and pray.

"I asked God if that picture was the work of evil spirits or the devil to take it away," Donelson says. "Immediately I was led to go into the next room and get a towel. It seemed as if a voice within me urged me to put soap and water on the towel. I went back to the front room and was led to stand up on a chair. Again I prayed to God and asked him if the picture was evil to take it away. It disappeared!"

"Did you rub the ceiling with the wet towel?" Mr. Donelson was asked. "Well, yes. But that wasn't what took the picture away. It was the prayer that did it, and the people who were here at the time will tell you so. The intelligent people of Mercer county are inclined to believe that while Donelson was sincere enough the picture was nothing more than a religious hallucination. Donelson is a member of the Apostolic church, whose members are often referred to as "Holy Rollers".
