

DIVORCE DECREE ORDERED IN THE BOOKER CASE

INFIDELITY OF WIFE PROVEN BY WITNESSES

Parker vs. Parker Now Before Court—Parties Formerly Lived in Gibson—Local Witnesses.

His Honor Judge Crockett this morning ordered a decree to issue "a vinculo matrimonii" in the action of Fred T. Booker vs. Sadie Booker. R. L. Simms appeared as proctor in the case which was undefended. The witnesses examined were R. W. L. Tibbits who proved the registration of the clergymen at the wedding, Rev. Edwin D. Turner, Fred T. Booker the plaintiff, Sheriff Albion R. Foster of Carleton County. It was proven that the defendant was living in Lewiston, Me., as the wife of Walter Bryant. The decree of divorce was ordered to issue at once. This case was from Carleton County.

Parker vs. Parker

J. J. F. Winslow appeared for Walter Limerick, proctor in the action of Sidney Albert Parker vs. Bertha Mabel Parker. This case had a number of witnesses from this vicinity, the parties having resided in Gibson. The witnesses examined were Lawrence Whitlock, R. W. L. Tibbits, Fred Venner and plaintiff.

Adultery was sworn to by Whitlock and Venner and the plaintiff swore to seeing his wife in bed with Whitlock. His Honor stated that there appeared to be a discrepancy between the evidence of the plaintiff and Whitlock.

Mr. Winslow argued that there was no discrepancy between the testimony of the two. Whitlock was merely confused with regard to dates in fact he was ignorant even of the year in which the war began.

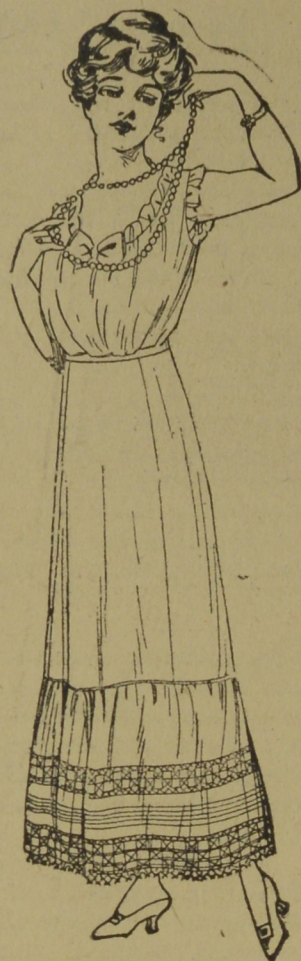
