

NEWFOUNDLAND EDITORS SEES THE BATTLEFIELDS

London Dec. 26.—J. Alex. Robinson LL.D., M. B. E., former Postmaster General of Newfoundland, and President of Robinson Co., Ltd., owners of the St. John's Newfoundland Daily News, is making a visit to the battlefields in company with Lieut. Col. Nangle, Newfoundland Graves Commissioner. A special pilgrimage is being made to Beaumont Hamel, Monchy, and other districts where the Newfoundland lads fought and died so gloriously.

Out of a total population of about 250,000 Newfoundland sent 100,000 fighting men overseas. Their record

as fighters is magnificent. At Beaumont Hamel where they went in 900 strong, only 63 came out.

Newfoundland has only one "V. C. 55"—Sergeant Ricketts but he has the unique distinction of being the youngest. He enlisted at the age of fifteen and won the coveted medal when he was eighteen. He attended the King's Garden Party to V. C.'s and was photographed with Sir Dighton Probyn the oldest living warrior with the V. C. Sergeant Ricketts is now back in Newfoundland, and according to Dr. Robinson is a "very brilliant lad."

Fish and pulp are the two industries that keep Newfoundland in the public eye. The fishing business according to Dr. Robinson, interviewed

by Cross-Atlantic when he was in London recently, is not too flourishing just now. High prices for catches during the war have been superseded by more normal conditions. But the cost of catching fish has increased instead of diminished since the Armistice.

On the pulp situation Dr. Robinson is more optimistic. "Grand Falls" he said "which was a perfect wilderness when Lord Northcliffe first arrived in Newfoundland, is today the second largest city of the Island and is forging ahead rapidly. I believe there is still further room for expansion and with judicious cutting and reforestation such as is going on under the Northcliffe management, the supply of pulp from Newfoundland ought to be adequate."

"The greatest danger to the pulp industry—forest fires—has reached what I believe is its irreducible minimum, through the great efficiency of the fire patrol run by the big pulp and timber companies in conjunction with the Government."

Dr. Robinson mentioned the possibilities of a new pulp field in Labra-

Messrs. David and Clarence Bruce who have been working at Arnold Brook, are home for a short visit.




