



Unemployment in Halifax

Halifax Chronicle: There is little or no change in Halifax in the past week in the unemployment situation and there are many men out of work with limited opportunities to get employ-ment offering. At present there is in the city a gentleman from Bathurst N. B., engaging 125 or 150 men to work on the timber lands of Price Bros. Co., Ltd., at Joncquere Junction and others at Lake St. John. The men set from \$55 to \$95 ror month mith get from \$85 to \$95 per month, with their fares paid to point of destination if they remain in the employ until March 15th.

Income Tax Forms

Two million copies of the various federal income tax forms for the past year will be issued within the next. year will be issued within the next few weeks, and the public will be re-quested to fill them out and return them to the income tax inspector for the district in which each taxpayer resides, or where companies have their head offices. The first forms to be issued will be special forms for companies employee trustees set companies, employers, trustees, etc. which must be returned by March 31. The forms for ordinary citizens will be issued later, and must be re-turned by April 30.
