

Sugar May be Lower Hope for a reduction in the price of sugar is sustained by the early reports from the Cuban sugar plantations, which have started their summer har-vest. In the Punta Alegro district the first crop weighed 120,000,000 pounds and 5,500 tons of this was sold at the plantation for six and one-half cents a pound a lower quotation they have a pound, a lower quotation than has been accepted for raw sugar for many months. The balance of this crop sold later at eleven cents a pound. It is es-timated that the value of the first crop for the entire country this year will be more than \$22,533.500 and the investors are looking forward to a profit of \$10 a bag, or about five cents a pound on all the sugar sold.

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
