

If you find a stain on your clothing or a disfiguring mark upon the furniture or carpet here is the remedy:

Acid-Use ammonia or chloroform Chocolate-Soak in kerosene and wash in cold water.

Coffee-Treat with boiling water when fresh.

Fruit-Soak fresh stains in milk or use oxalic acid. Grass-Rub the spots with molas

ses and wash. Greese-Rub French chalk or ful-

ler's earth on spots. Ink-Use salt and lemon juice.

Mildew-Use lemon and salt or javelle water. Mud-Soak in kerosene.

Paint-Use turpentine or benzine Perspiration-Boiling water will re

Tea-Use boiling water. Wine-Put dry salt on fresh stains warm milk on old ones.

PERSPIRATION STAINS.

Boiled white will come from the wash boiler much whiter if a few water.

TO CLEAN VEILS.

Sponge mourning veils with warm lcohol and two or three drops of ter, inegar instead of the borax. For sponging black use a piece of black woollen cloth. After sponging on both sides place a moderately thick piece of wrapping paper over the veil and press with a warm iron. Veils of Brussels net are frenshened by the same treatment. When dry either fold loosely or roll around a pasteboard tube. If draped on a hat a veil can usually be pressed in this way without removing.

WHITE VEILS.

To clean white veils put the weil in a solution of pure white soapy water and allow it to simmer for ten minutes. Drain carefully and put it in three times to rinse it free from soap and then pass it through clean cold water to which has been added a little iquid blue. Pour a pint of boiling water upon a teaspoon of starch dampened with cold water and pass the veil through it. Clap it well between the hands, pull out to shape carefully and pin every point down, keepirg the edges all quite straight.
