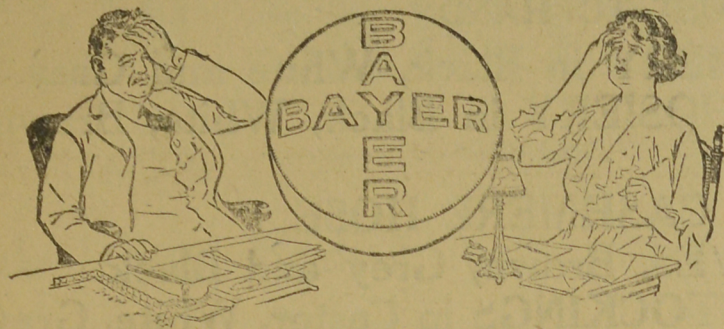

## LONDONERS PAY HIGH FOR CHIPPENDALES

Lively Bidding Marks Recent  
Sale of Furniture—One  
Chair Brought  
\$225.

London, Nov. 23.—The sale of the furniture belonging to the late president of the Royal Academy Sir Edward Poynter which was sold from his house in Addison road, Kensington, was an important one. He had some wonderful specimens of Chippendale furniture which fetched considerable sums.

There was six beautiful mahogany chairs, for example that went for \$225 each, and four others that seemed to me equally attractive that fetched \$125 apiece.

One carved mahogany easy chair also by Chippendale brought nearly \$600, and a mahogany settee of the same maker which had carved legs and claw feet and a stamped velvet covering, brought the big sum of \$2,700. Nowadays the most extraordinary prices are being paid in England for furniture, both old and modern, and few people, unless they be "war rich", are able to afford the luxury of refurnishing.

## MR. ELIHU ROOT WILL HELP ORGANIZE WORLD'S COURT

Honor for Distinguished American Lawyer and Statesman—  
Court is Provided for Under the League of Nations—Will  
be Composed of the Most Eminent Jurists in the World  
and Will Have an Advisory Capacity.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 1.—Elihu Root, formerly Secretary of State, will be called upon to give his assistance and advice in the launching of the great international Supreme Court provided under the League of Nations.

Of the instrumentalities which are to be set in motion almost immediately upon the proclamation of peace, the international court of justice is regarded by the Supreme Council as of ranking importance. Consequently, that body through its secretary, in London, already has gone as far as possible towards the creation of the court in advance of the actual declaration of peace.

Plans have been so far perfected as to permit of the extension to certain jurists of international reputation of invitations to form a managerial committee to plan the details of the permanent court of international justice, and to define the scope of its activities.

To start with men of wide reputation from a few of the Entente nations and the United States have been selected, but it is probable that additions will be made to the list, even to the point of admission of great jurists from late enemy states, provided their governments have adhered to the league. The purpose is to name such members of the committee, not with preference to their nationality, but solely upon the basis of reputation as great interna-

tional lawyers and judges. This would make it possible to include some Latin-American names, regardless of the political importance of their nations.

Mr. Root's name has been favorably considered in the selection of these managers in full recognition of the fact that the United States has not yet finally approved the peace treaty. The reason is found in the unremitting efforts of the former Secretary of State to bring such a tribunal as the international court into existence, beginning when he was premier of President Roosevelt's Cabinet.

### Almost Made Real Court

Through the American Society of International Law he has urged the project, and it is stated that in the negotiations in London accompanying the ultimately futile attempt to organize an international prize court, former Secretary Root very nearly succeeded in transforming that limited tribunal into a real court for the adjudication of nearly all issues between nations

that might threaten to involve them in war.

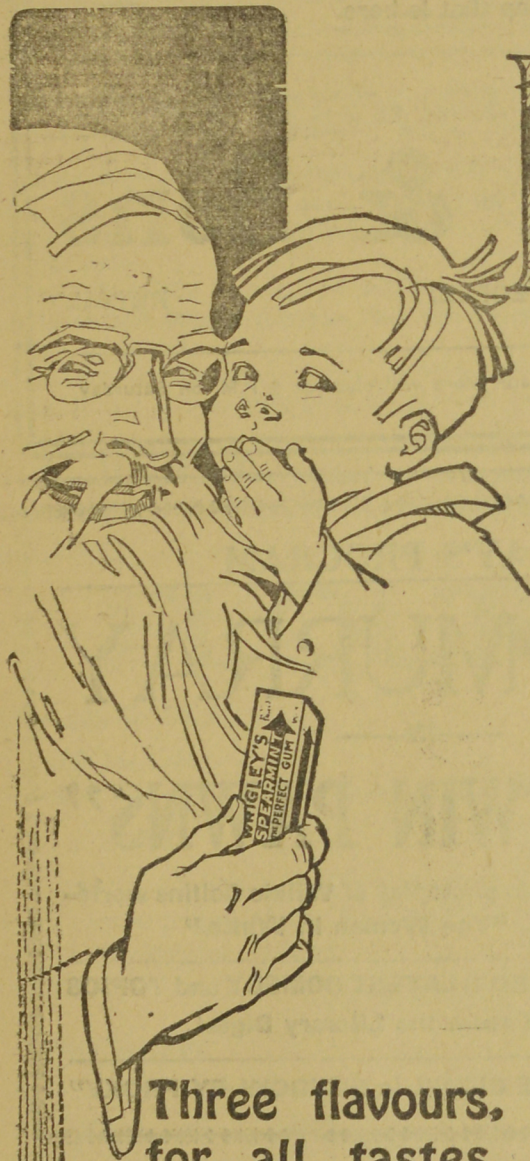
The great difficulty in finding a satisfactory plan for such court always has been the adjustment of the claims of the smaller nations to equal representation in membership with the great powers, and it was Mr. Root who finally proposed what it was believed would be a solution of the problem had the whole project not been abandoned. Therefore the persons who are making the plans for the meeting of the manager, which is to take place soon in London, have felt assured that they could count upon the active assistance of Mr. Root, even in the absence of final action by his government upon the peace treaty.

### Secretary Is Inviting

The invitations are being extended through the London secretariat, with the design to give life immediately upon the promulgation of the treaty to Article XIV., which reads:

"The council shall formulate and submit to the members of the league adoption plans for the establishment of a permanent court of international justice. The court shall be competent to hear and determine any dispute of an international character which the parties thereto submit. The court may also give an advisory opinion on any dispute or question referred to it by the council or by the assembly."

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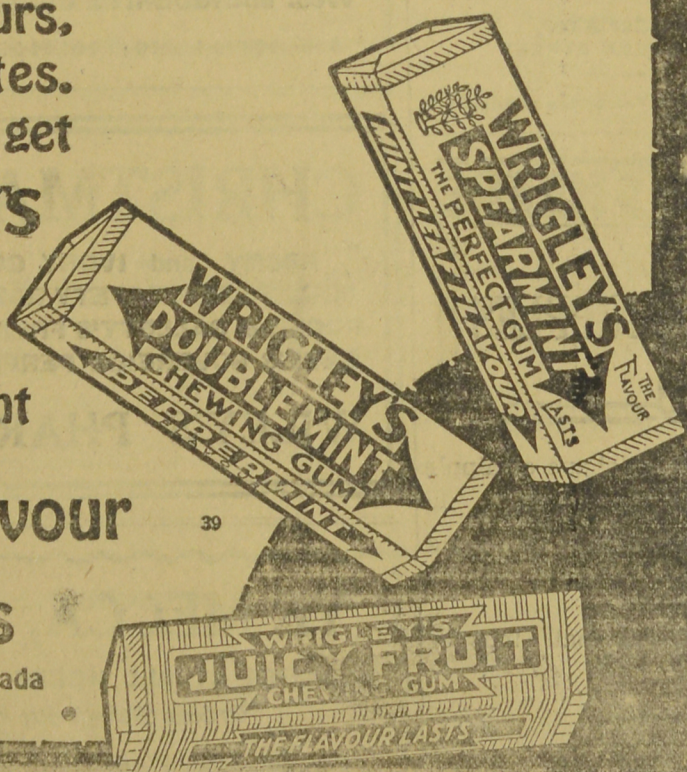

## CHORUS GIRL SPEAKS FOR HER CLASS

Boston, Jan. 3.—"Who makes the better wife—a college graduate or a chorus girl? Which gives the better training for marital responsibilities: mathematics or cosmetics—burning the midnight oil or the Broadway white lights—a string of degrees or the ability to do the shimmy?"

This is the momentous question which has been raised by S. M. Carey Thomas, president of Bryn Mawr College in a recent address to the students. Her address has stirred up a controversy among college girls and members of the "merry merry," of which in the latter the chorus of "Tumble In" take issue.

"We believe said the Bryn Mawr president, "that a husband can enjoy the company of a college graduate better than that of a chorus girl. We believe here at the college that a wife and mother could not know too much.

"It is when we come to live that a college education counts most. The women of my generation and earlier generations, I might say from the time of Eve itself, have tried practical applied education." But President Thomas's views are not upheld by the that contribute to the gaiety of "Tumble In."

"The idea of such a thing," says pretty Yvonne Le Vale of that chorus, who acts as spokesman for her colleagues. "You can take it from me," continues Yvonne "that what a chorus girl lacks in grammar, she easily makes up for in entertaining ability. And besides (naively), what good is grammar anyway in social discourse, when you know each other? Education has nothing whatever to do with marital happiness. Chorus girls, being thrown on their own as it were, by the itinerant side of their profession are naturally more practical and we don't scorn cooking and mending the way that many degree holders do. All that talk that associates us chorus girls with flimsiness, expensive raiment and diamonds, not to mention 'loose hours', is pure bunkum.

It seldom occurs to any of these misguided persons that we chorus girls might be plain, everyday human beings like the rest of our everyday sisters with the same average of joy and sorrows, and the same percentage of problems due to the high rents, the dreadful cost of food, and the luxury tax on silk. And I want to add that we girls do not find it necessary to hire a secretary to repel the advances of importunate millionaires. At that sometimes I wish this myth were true."
