THE LUMBER INDUSTRY OF CANADA

that repairs and renovations which were neglected during the war on the ground of economy and thrift, could not be longer delayed, and this work has also come in for its share of attention.

About a year ago it was thought that there would be a surplus of forest products in Canada, and that the devastated countries of Europe would naturally be looking to the Dominion for a large share of constructional material, but the building boom in the United States created an unprecedented demand for many kinds of Canadian woods, and the home market became exceptionally active, so that out side of the billion feet of pine and spruce which was purchased by the British timber buyer over a year ago and the majority of it transported during the past season, not a great deal of export business was carried on owing to inadequate tonnage and excessive ocean freight rates.

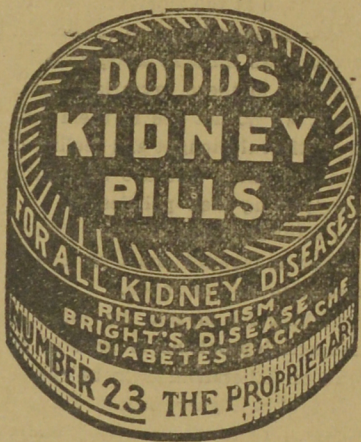
It will be remembered that early in the year Mr. A. C. Manbert of Toronto was sent to England by the Ontario Government as Lumber Commissioner for the Province, in order to conduct propaganda work in the interest of white pine and other woods. Mr. Manbert returned at the end of six months having completed his task in an eminently satisfactory manner. It was felt that a publicity and educational campaign could be carried only to a certain stage and that it must be followed up by active selling and delivery of the merchandise. Owing to the scarcity of lumber at home this was not possible at the present juncture.

Building is Active

Home-builders, contractors and others, who have been delaying construction in the hope that there would be a drop in the price of material have been disappointed and according to the present market trend, the longer the delay in undertaking work, the more expensive it is likely to become to carry out any proposed plan. The rising values have not deterred building activity to any appreciable extent and reports from various lumber merchants throughout the country indicate that 1920 will witness the greatest enterprise in the dwelling, factory and warehouse line that has taken place within the last decade.

High Production Costs

On the average, prices of lumber have increased considerably but these advances, it is claimed have been moderate when compared with the increases that have been brought about in closely allied requirements such as glass, plumbing, hardware, brick, tile and other materials. It is costing the average lumberman nearly 200 per

Change in Accounting

Mr. Carter said he wished to take the opportunity of supporting what Mr. McLellan had stated concerning the abundance of money in the country and the necessity of investing it government reports showed upwards of one billion dollars in savings banks. cent. more to get out his logs today, drive them to the mill and convert them into the finished product than it did before the war, when the wages of the lumberjack were about \$30 a month and good board could be supplied for 40 cents to 50 cents a day. Now woodsmen receive on the average \$65 to \$75 a month and board costing from \$1.10 to \$1.25 a day, while the efficiency of the shantymen has decreased to a remarkable extent.

The closing of the year has, on the whole, however, been a satisfactory one for the lumberman, and his greatest problem during 1920 will be production.

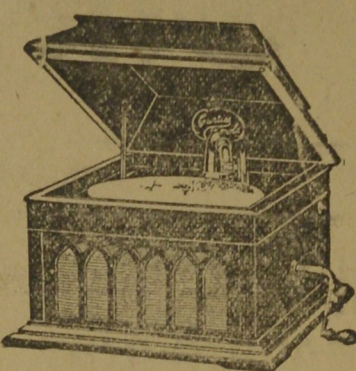

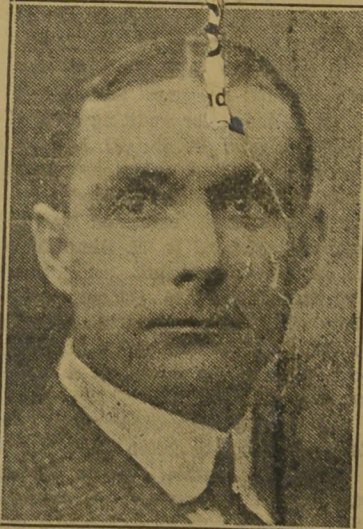

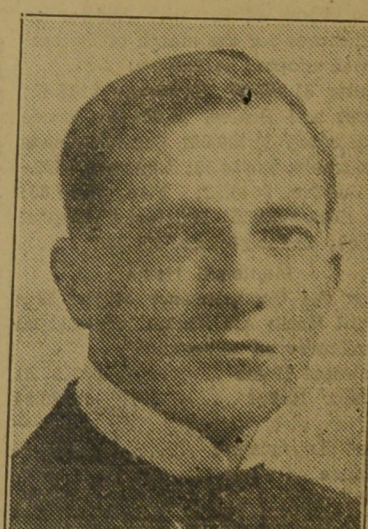
