## COUN. TABOR C. EVERETT ELECTED WARDEN OF YORK COUNTY-COUNCIL DECIDES FOR TWO-YEAR TERM

Unanimous Vote for Kingsclear Councillor — Victory Loan Campaign Flag Presented to County by R. W. McLellan — Plea Made for York Commercial Club — Country Said to Have Abundance of Money — Suggestion of County Auditor to Make Change in System of Accounting Adopted.

Coun. Tabor C. Everett of Kingsclear was elected Warden of York County Tuesday afternoon at the opening session of the annual meeting of the Municipal Council. He succeeds Coun. Chesley Hallett of Queensbury. The new Warden will serve for two years the Municipal Council deciding by an overwhelming vote to change the term from one year to two so as to correspond with the councillor's term.

A feature of the opening session was the presentation of a Prince of Wales Flag with three crests indicating that York County in the 1919 Victory Loan campaign subscribed its allotment and seventy-five per cent beyond, in this instance a total of \$1,750,000. The flag was presented by Ex-Ald. R. W. McLellan of Fredericton chairman of the District Campaign Committee and was formally accepted by the retiring Warden. It is now draped in a conspicuous position on the walls of the council chamber.

Ex-Ald. McLellan in his address of presentation sounded the note of optimism pointing out that the achieve-

ments of New Brunswick in three successive Victory Loan campaigns showed that her people had unexpected financial resources and that if they were used to promote industry, farming and commercial activity the province would be one of the most prosperous of the Dominion.

He made an especial plea for support of the York Commercial Club recently organized to promote the interests of this section of New Brunswick, and asked for the support and interest of the municipal councillors.

At the suggestion of the County Auditor, Mr. Robert Carter, changes in the system of accounting were made. The standing committees for the session were also appointed.

According to custom the session was opened with prayer, Very Rev. S. Neales, Dean of Fredericton performing the duties of Chaplain.

Dean Neales' Address

At the request of Warden Hallett, Dean Neales addressed the council briefly. He congratulated the Council upon a very successful and prosperous year. The Warden he particularly con-

## TELEGRAPH OPERATORS GET WAGE INCREASE

In common with thirty-two thousand of their fellow employees in more genial clime, but I never expect other cities, the local branch of the Western Union Telegraph Co. who have been six months or more in the service of the Company will participate in salary increases totalling over five million dollars a year commencing January 1st. Employees who have been in the service a year or more will receive a fifteen percent increase and those who have been six months but less than a year in the service will receive ten per cent. Only employees who receive less than \$250 per month will participate.

Manager F. W. Smith of the local office states that these increases are in pursuance of an agreement reached some time ago between the management and the Association of Western Union Employees.

The Western Union is one of the large corporations which engages in the process of collective bargaining with its employees, and this is the latest of several general increases which have been negotiated as a means of offsetting to a certain extent, the increased cost of living which has fallen heavily upon the smaller class.

gratulated upon the happy event which recently came into his life coupling the congratulations with those to Mrs. Hallett. The country was out of the shadow of war. The great struggle had been followed by strikes and unrest but in general there was industry and prosperity. This was particularly true of New Brunswick which probably never had been so prosperous. Of course that completion had followed all great wars to be followed invariably by depression within two or three years. This war probably would be no exception but all could hope that New Brunswick would escape any great depression. It could not be expected that prices could keep their present high level. Salaried men certainly hoped prices would come down. Farmers and producers no doubt hoped they would not. However it must be expected that there would be a readjustment of value and when it should come the producers must remember that while they would not receive so much they also would pay less out. He had been informed that railwaymen, best paid of all tradesmen, preferred the old times with wages lower and prices less.

In conclusion Dean Neales wished his hearers a happy and prosperous New Year.

The Secretary Treasurer Mrs. A. O. J. Glen presented to the Council the official returns of the biennial election in York County in September last.

Victory Loan Flag

Warden Hallett then introduced Mr. R. W. McLellan of Fredericton, chairman of the Victory Loan Organization in the York District, who was to present the flag won by the district in the recent campaign.

Mr. McLellan pointed out that York District which included two parishes of Sunbury County when asked to raise \$1,000,000 for the Victory Loan of 1919 raised \$1,750,000 exceeding its allotment by seventy-five per cent. The flag which he would present bore three of the Prince of Wales' crests emblematic of exceeding the quota to the extent named.

The City of Fredericton subscribed little short of a million of that amount and the remainder of the district the balance. York County had the extreme honor of leading all the Municipal districts of this province not only in the Victory Loan of 1919 but also in 1918 and 1917.

The campaign had shown that the country was prosperous. He had no doubt if another loan was called that York District could subscribe a million and a half notwithstanding the excellent showing which it had made in 1919.

Sign of Expansion

He wished at this point to emphasize the fact that the people of New Brunswick and of the Maritime Provinces too long had been content to place their surplus money in the savings bank at three per cent interest. The Government loan campaigns had made thousands of people investors. In York District alone there had been 1,875 applicants for the loan.

Commercial Club

The country never was so prosperous. Some desired to return to the conditions prior to 1914. For his part he did not and did not expect to. He felt that there was an opportunity to refer to an organization recently formed which had as its object the advancement of manufacturing, commerce,

agriculture, education and other public activities in this particular section of New Brunswick. He referred to the York Commercial Club. That was not a Fredericton organization but one which belonged to the entire county. The formation of that Commercial Club, as had the organization of similar bodies in St. John, Halifax, and other places, had been the direct result of the training of the canvassers and staff of the Victory Loan campaign. He could not help but ask the support and interest of every councillor for that club.

Warden Hallett thanked Mr. McLellan and said he greatly appreciated the honor which York had achieved. If another appeal were made he believed the county would do as well. It was the desire of the councillors to assist in every way in the development of the country.

Two Year Term for Warden

The Warden then informed the council that the election of a Warden was the next item of business. In the past that officer had been elected for municipalities the custom was to have a two-year term. He believed York County should adopt the longer term to correspond with that of the councillors.

Warden Hallett then called for a standing vote on the question of a two year term. By an overwhelming vote the council declared for the longer term.

Warden Everett Elected

Coun. E. H. Allen of Marysville then placed in nomination Coun. Tabor C. Everett of Kingsclear. No other nomination was made.

Immediately before Warden Hallett declared his successor elected, Coun. Brewer of Douglas extended a vote of thanks to the retiring warden for whom three cheers and a tiger were given for that officer and Mrs. Hallett

Warden Everett briefly thanked the councillors for the honor conferred upon him.

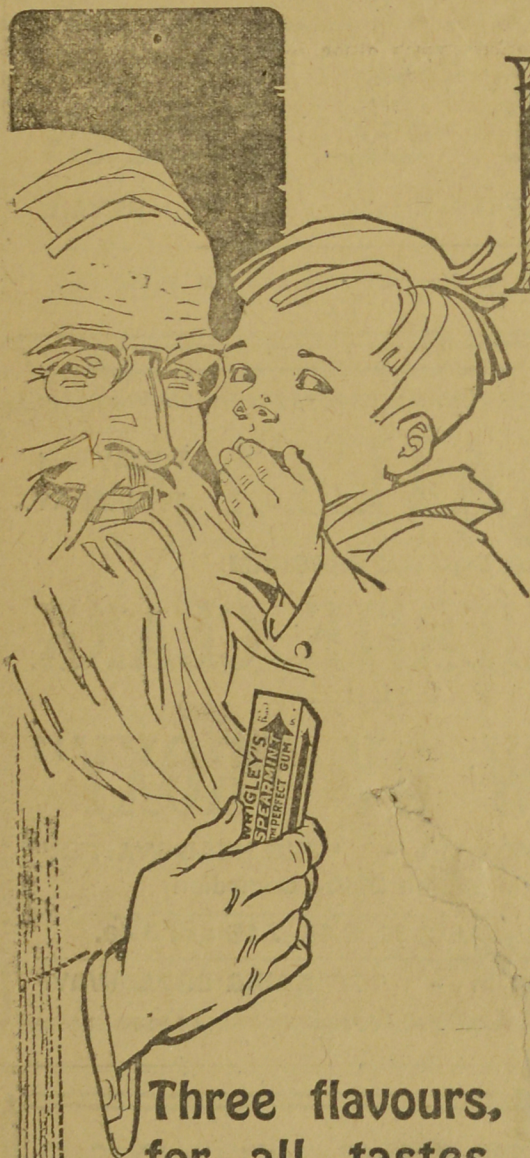
Auditor's Report

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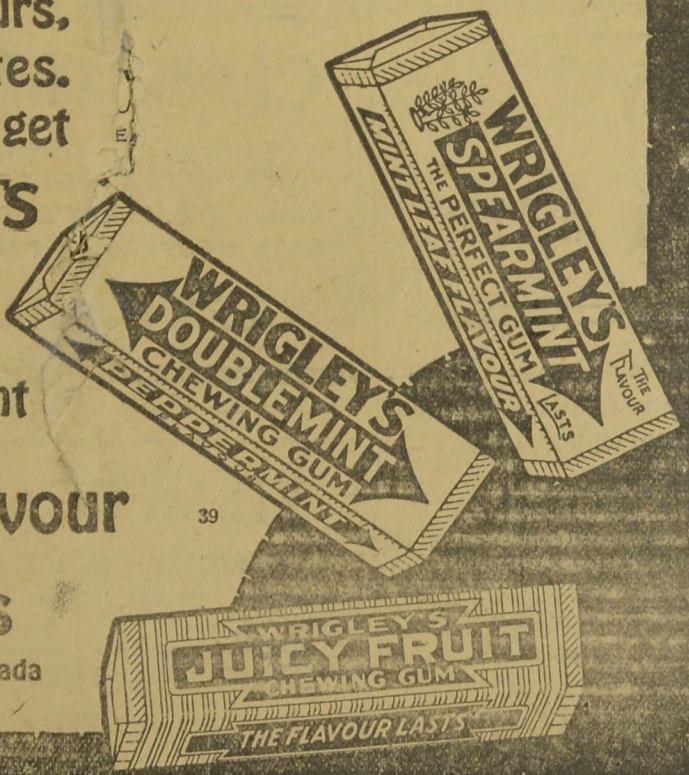
