COMMITTEE ROOMS TO BE OPENED FRIDAY

Complete Canvass of the City to be Attempted Before Election Day, July 10th.

Women organized committees for the Prohibition Campaign at a meeting held yesterday afternoon in the Y. M. C. A. building. The attendance was not as large as had been expected but was very representative. Organization for both polling sub-divisions of Fredericton was completed and committee rooms will be opened in the rooms formerly occupied by the Red Triangle, Queen Street, Arthur M. Gibson having placed them at the disposal of the committee.

The committee rooms will be open for the first time on Friday. There will be some person there from 2 p. m. until 10 p. m. each day. Information will be given there.

About 1,400 cans of milk and cream arrived in St. John yesterday morning on the Sussex train, which was put back on the old schedule to meet the wishes of the Kings County milk producers. During the milk boycott the average daily supply before the strike was between 1,400 and 1,600 cans.

Military Notes
Col. A. H. Powell left St. John Tuesday for Valcartier camp where he is to be decorated by Col. Vuchitrie, officer commanding the Czecho-Slovaks, for his services in Siberia during the war. All men of the C. E. F. who are retained on the strength will be transferred to a general list in this district to be known as No. 7 Detachment, C. E. F. There will be nine men on this list in M. D. No. 7.

Farewell Sermon
Rev. Frank Baird, who recently resigned as pastor of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church at Woodstock, preached his farewell sermon on Sunday. In the evening at the home of Hon. J. K. Fleming he was presented by the congregation with a purse of \$150. Rev. Mr. Baird has no immediate plans for the future but will rest for six months. He is now at his former home in Chipman.

Dangerous Sidewalks
A lady proceeding down Queen St. yesterday was tripped by one of the numerous holes in the sidewalk and fell sustaining a painful injury. The civic authorities are giving considerable attention to the streets, but they are allowing the sidewalks to get into a dilapidated condition. The sidewalks are not only an eyesore but are a source of considerable danger. If repairs are to be made the work should be attended to at once.

Against Three-Heat Plan
St. John Times: Peter Faren, local pacer, is in training at Moosepath and is beginning to round into form. His owner, David O'Keefe, says he will not start him in a race before July 27 when he expects to have him in good condition. Asked regarding his opinion of the three or five heat racing, he said he strongly favored the latter, as did the majority of local horsemen. The question of running races through out the province under the old system of heat two out of three heats had been the subject of much discussion and is said it is not generally favored in these parts.

Against Prohibition.
An organization meeting of those opposed to Prohibition was held in St. John last night. It was announced by several speakers that organized labor throughout the country was in favor of beer and light wines and dissatisfaction was expressed with the present prohibitory law. Several speakers said that they thought it was "a case of one law for the rich and another for the poor" and it was announced that "many of the statements advertised by the prohibition workers as to the absence of drunkenness and the emptiness of the jails, as compared with pre-prohibition days, were false."

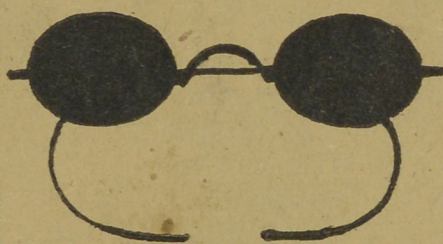
Obtaining Information.

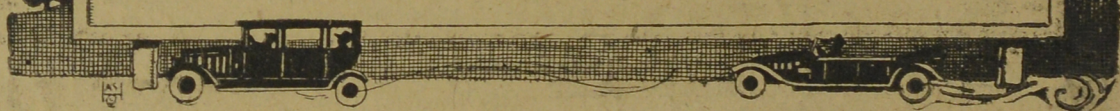
