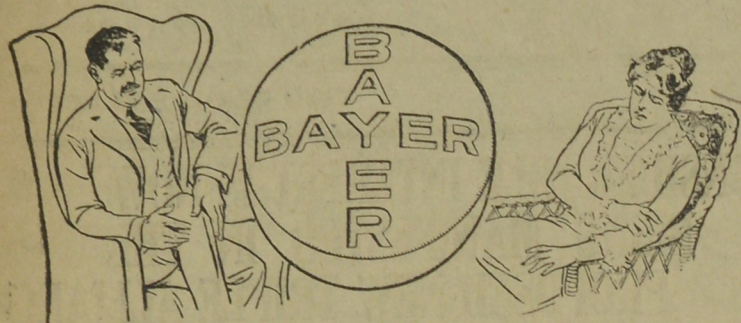

## CHRISTMAS CLOSING IN SCHOOLS OF THIS CITY AND THE VICINITY

### Charlotte Street School.

Grades I and II of the Charlotte Street School, under Miss Cecil Gallagher conducted their exercises, a playlet entitled "Mrs. Santa Helps Along" with songs, recitations and dialogues, in their own class room, after they had finished their regular exercises. The whole class took part in the playlet and short drill which accompanied it. The blackboards were decorated with drawings and the Christmas air prevailed the whole assembly.

The other grades in the school from Grade III to Grade VIII held joint exercises in the Assembly Hall. Miss Betts' class, Grade V held a Christmas Festival of Peace Music and Good Cheer.
