OWNERSHIP At the recent annual meeting of the Bank of Montreal, Sir Vincent Mere lith had this to say the shareholder on government ownership in Canada and the financial situation:

Canada today has a very large Na-ional Railway System, which is peng operated at a heavy loss, thereby nereasing the load on an already heav-Ty tax-burdened country. Sooner or later some means must be found to relieve this situation. Some confi-dently believe that by proper public administration of the lines, deficits can be cut down. My own view is that the proper solution will be found if the he proper solution will be found if the Government, at the earliest feasible

ime, divests itself of ownership and operation of the roads and places them ander corporate control upon terms air to the country and upon conditions hat will ensure the service for which he construction of the lines was un-

lertaken. To sum up, the situation in Canada at present, as I view it, is that while there does not appear to be any cause for apprehension, there is every reason for the exercise of the utmost measure of caution. Canada cannot disassociate herself from world con-ditions and world conditions are not satisfactory. On this continent 'the two years supervening upon the Ar-mistice have been marked by unex-ampled trade activity and prosperity, a circumstance common to the conlusion of all great wars, but the reaction has set in and may not yet be n full play. Happily Canada is well buttressed on many sides, and the ex ercise of prudence and sagacity should enable her to meet the shock of fall ing prices, restricted credits and deflated currency, without serious im pairment of her commercial and finan

'On the side of constructive policy' said Mr. King, "the Liberal party be lieves that there are problems arising out of the high cost of living, abuses in the nature of profiteering, inequali ties in taxation, revisions of the tariff problems of soldiers' civil re-establishment, of railroad management and railway rate control, of agricultural and rural development, of industry and industrial relations in the cities and towns, and of electoral reform, all of which require special and immediate consideration. Needless to say that in its conduct of these matters, the Liberal party, should it be returned to power, will be guided by moderation and toleration, of orderly progress and the avoidance of extreme positions and measures." At this point Mr. King dealt with the tariff. He said: "The Liberal party believes that the most important of all matters is the early restoration of representative and responsible government. This is an issue greater even than the tariff. As regards the tariff, the prime consideration is that it shall be made by, or in accordance with the will of the house of commons fairly reprenting all classes of the people of Canada. The first requisité, therefore, of a re vised tariff, is a truly representative house of commons. Such a body does not now exist."
