TWO MILLION DOLLARS TO BE PAID SIR CHAS. ROSS

Claim of the Ross Rifle Company is Settled by the Federal Government—Case Has Been Pending for Some Time in the Exchequer Court of Canada—Large Sum Realized in the Sale of Ribes, Machinery, etc.

Ottawa, Jan. 22—The government acting on the advice of its counsel, Messrs. Tilley and Meredith, of Toronto has finally settled for two million dollars the claim of Sir Charles Ross for compensation for the expropriation of his rifle factory and plant at Quebec, under the War Measures Act in March of 1917.

The case was pending in the exchequer court and was to have come up for hearing this coming spring, the court's award being limited to a maximum of three million dollars according to the terms of the order in council, granting the fiat. Sir Charles Ross though advised by his counsel that the full amount allowed by the limitations of the order in council could be secured from the court agreed to waive and accept the two million offered by the government in view of a quick and final settlement. The cheque was paid over to him today.

About one million dollars, it is said have been realized by the government on the sale of rifles, machinery, raw materials taken over and a fully equipped plant now remains in the possession of the people of Canada to be used according to the terms of the expropriation order in council "for the manufacture as a permanent government undertaking of the rifles and small arms required for the arming of the naval and military forces of Canada."

Value of Fisheries

Ottawa, Jan. 22—The total value of sea fish at the point of landing on both the coasts of Canada during the last month was \$1,232,203 as compared with a total value of \$1,177,188 in December, 1918. This is shown by the monthly statement issued today from the naval department which states that fishing conditions during December on the Atlantic coast were difficult owing to severe storms. The stormy weather resulted in somewhat reduced landings of cod, haddock, hake and pollock. The aggregate total of these fish during the past month was 68,000 swt. and for December, 1918, it was 84,000 swt. The catch of smelts however, was greater than in the previous year as was also the lobster catch.

Mental Hygiene

Ottawa, Jan. 22—Canada will be represented at the third convention of Mental Hygiene Societies of the United States and Canada, which will be held in New York in February, under the auspices committee of mental hygiene of the New York States Charities and Aid Association. Since the last convention held in New Orleans in 1916, a national committee for Canada has been organized and through it the dominion will be represented at the forthcoming gathering.

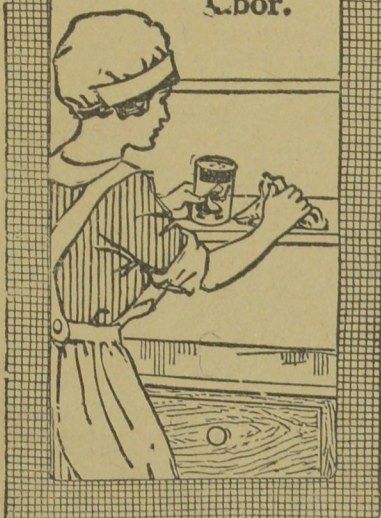
A Cheque Deal

New York, Jan. 23—Robert Nott, eighty years old, a retired shipyard worker, and his wife, Catharine, seventy-two years old, were accidentally killed by illuminating gas in Brooklyn yesterday. They lived with a married daughter, Mrs. C. Sampson, at No. 265 Ninth street. When Mrs. Sampson returned from a shopping trip she found her father, who was an invalid, in a rocking chair, and at his feet lay her mother, both dead. Escaping gas from a heater in the kitchen caused their deaths.

A pipe attached to a gas heater in the room of Charles Harrington, thirty years old, at No. 1201 Southern Boulevard the Bronx, became accidentally disconnected during the night Harrington was dead when discovered by John Fraser, a son of the proprietor of the house.

Will Travel Over Valley Line

St. John Globe: C. A. Hayes, vice-president, C.N.R.; H. H. Melanson, passenger traffic manager, C. N. R., Toronto; A. H. Lindsay, advertising manager, Moncton, and two newspaper men arrived this morning to make arrangements for the proposed tour of United States journalists through the Maritime Provinces next summer. The party will leave for Digby tomorrow morning. Last year some 200 American journalists made a tour of the Western Provinces and this year it is the intention to have them travel this section over the C. N. R. including a trip over the Valley Railway.

HAS FOUND A NEW COMET

Cambridge, Mass., Jan. 22—Discovery of a new comet by a Spanish observer was announced by the Harvard Observatory tonight. A cablegram to the observatory from Professor Leconte in charge of the new Central International Bureau of Astronomical Telegrams at Brussels, gave the information that the comet had been discovered on January 13 by Comas Sola, director of the observatory at Barcelona.

The comet at present is visible only by the aid of a large telescope. Its position when discovered was right ascension 8 degrees 6 minutes 44 seconds, declination minus 22 degrees, 22

minutes, no seconds. It is situated in the constellation Puppis somewhat east of Sirius. Its daily motion was given as 1 minute 12 seconds west, 5 minutes, no seconds, of arc south.
