In case the claimant wishes to take further action in the matter the magistrate is holding over the order for the destroying of the liquor.

### No Office Deliveries

Rev. W. D. Wilson, chief inspector under the prohibitory act, announced yesterday that the express companies will not be permitted to deliver liquor imports at their offices but must make deliveries at the home of the persons to which the goods are addressed.

### To Visit Fredericton

At the meeting of the N. B. Tourist Association at St. John yesterday it was stated that the members of the New England Editorial Association, two hundred strong, would visit New Brunswick in June next. They plan to be in Fredericton on the 14th. Possibly the whole party may go to Dalhousie to attend the annual meeting of the New Brunswick Tourist, Game and Resources Association.

### New Military Clasp

A clasp will be issued to all members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who served in France between August 5, 1914, and midnight of November 22 and 23 1914, when the Hun was turned back at the battle of the Marne. The clasp is in bronze with the dates engraved and is to be worn on the 1914 star, which has been issued to all soldiers serving in France up until December 31, 1914. Those who are entitled to this decoration must apply to the district record officer who will forward the applications to the proper authorities.

## FURTHER IMPROVEMENT INTENDED IN FOREST TELEPHONE SERVICE—GAME SEASON LIKELY CURTAILED

Two Extensions from Bald Mountain Contemplated, One to Hazen Settlement and the Other to Miller's on Tobique—Little Blue Hill Suggested as Observation Point—Gasoline Fire Engine Purchased for Forest Fire Fighting—Survey of Game Reserve to be Made This Year.

The Advisory Board of the Crown Land Department in session here yesterday dealt with a number of matters of interest. All members were present with the exception of D. J. Buckley who has been ill.

### Telephone Extensions

One matter of importance was the extension of the forest telephone lines. Chief Forester G. H. Prince reported on this subject. One proposal which has been made is the extension of the telephone line from Bald Mountain at the head of the Tobique River north westerly to Hazen Settlement and to continue the line down the Tobique from Bald Mountain to Miller's. It also has been proposed to extend the line to Little Blue Mountain which is six miles southwest of the mouth of Riley Brook on the Tobique. An extensive view from this hill can be obtained, its elevation being 2080 feet. This is some four hundred feet higher than either Upper or Lower Blue Mountain which can be overlooked. An alternative suggestion has been made that a hill near Three Brooks can be used to better advantage than Little Blue Mountain. The Chief Forester will visit both places and make an inspection. Further action will depend upon his report.

### Fire Engine Purchased

Col. T. G. Loggie Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines, reported that the Department had made a purchase of a gasoline fire-engine with fifteen hundred feet of hose. The purchase is in the nature of an experiment. The engine will be used to fight incipient fires in the woods. If the engine is a success further purchases probably will follow.

### The Game Reserve

It was decided to place four men on the Game Reserve as special wardens. During this winter the reserve will be surveyed by forest engineers.

A complete survey of the boundaries is proposed to be made at once. It also is the intention to have the Reserve delimited by a strip cut clear six feet in width. Signboards notifying the public that the area is a Game Reserve for animals and fish will be placed at all crossing points on

streams, portages and prominent places.

### Changes in Game Law

No official or semi-official announcement is made concerning the Game Law and possible changes but it is expected that the coming session of the legislature will see the open season for big game curtailed by the opening date being set back from September 15th to October 1st. It also is probable that a two-weeks open season for partridge will be declared.
