## New Buildings

District No. 3, Parish of Greenwich has now a large convenient school house; but the ratepayers show but little interest in school matters and no teacher has been engaged. No. 1½ St. Marys, lately reorganized, has fine new buildings and the pupils of this district now can attend school in comfort. The Wisely district, after considerable persuasion, has an entirely new set of buildings on a site much better than the old one. Though there was some opposition to the requirements of the Educational Authorities, now that these are an accomplished fact the ratepayers seem pleased that their children have such comfort. The experience of this community is another proof that sometimes, in educational matters, it is wise to go ahead of local public opinion.

Taymouth, No. 12, Parish of St. Mary's, has completed a fine concrete school building, which also contains an excellent class-room. This district is one of the very few districts that employ a male teacher.

Fredericton City contains some thirty-three departments. While the quality of the work done in these varies somewhat, in the majority the high standard of former years has been maintained. The Grammar School now has a staff of five teachers, of whom four are males. The standing of all departments is most satisfactory. While credit is due to each member of the staff, special credit is due the Principal for his skilful supervision and untiring energy.

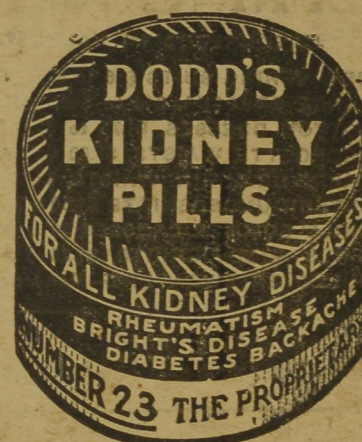

## NOTICE OF LEGISLATION.

Notice is hereby given that a bill will be presented at the next Session of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick on behalf of the Town of Devon, for the purpose of enabling the said Town to obtain an additional supply of water for use in the said Town, and for that purpose that authority be given to acquire by purchase, lease or expropriation any source of water supply within the limits of said Town and within four miles thereof, together with the lands upon which the water is situate and bordering same; also, such lands or easements as may be necessary for conveying said water to the said Town; also the power to issue debentures and borrow money to meet the expense of same.
