**OF INTEREST TO WOMEN****SEASONABLE RECIPES.****Caramel Mousse.**

Two cups sugar, 4 eggs, 1 quart of milk, 1 pint cream. Melt the sugar in a pan, stir until melted; add cup hot water, simmer till dissolved. Scald the milk, pour hot milk on the well beaten eggs, add melted sugar and cook in double boiler till smooth, stirring constantly. When cool whip the cream and pour in custard a little at a time; stir well. Freeze like ice cream.

**Maple Mousse.**

Beat the yolks of 4 eggs and add 1 cup of maple syrup and boil for about 3 minutes. Then add when cold 1 pint of whipped cream and lastly add the whites beaten stiff. Pack in ice and salt 3 or 4 hours before serving.

**Jellied Chicken.**

Simmer until the meat slips from the bones and there remains of the water about a large cupful. List out the meat and cut or shred into good sized pieces, throwing out all fat, bone and gristle. Skim the fat from the liquor and add pepper and salt to season very highly, then bring to a boil with half an ounce of gelatine, which has been dissolved in just enough cold water to cover it. Pour this over the shredded chicken, stir thoroughly and pack into a mould. Serve on a bed of lettuce and pass apple or crabapple jelly with it.

**Apple Custard Pudding.**

Peel, core and quarter three large apples and stew in water to half cover them; add sugar to make a syrup, flavoured with lemon and dispose in a buttered deep baking dish. Beat the yolks of 3 eggs, add 3 tablespoonfuls of sugar and a dash of salt, then add 1½ cups of hot milk and cook over boiling water until the custard coats the spoon. Remove from the fire, flavor with lemon and pour over the apples. Beat the whites to a stiff froth, add 3 tablespoonfuls of sugar, spread over the pudding, sprinkle the meringue with granulated sugar and brown in a hot oven.

**Black Chocolate Cake.**

Cream half cup of butter, add 1½ cups of sugar and cream again, add the beaten yolks of 3 eggs, four ounces of chocolate dissolved in 5 tablespoonfuls of boiling water, quarter cup of milk, 1½ cups of flour mixed and sifted with two level teaspoons of baking powder, 2 teaspoons of vanilla and finally fold in the stiffly beaten whites. Bake in loaf in a moderate oven and frost when cool.

**LUNCHEON SANDWICHES.**

A substantial sandwich is really enough for a luncheon plus your favorite midday beverage and possibly a bit of fruit to end with. Here are some suggestions for the sandwiches:

Sausage sandwiches: Mix one cup of cooked and minced sausage with one cup of melted cream cheese, a bit of mustard, paprika and spread between thin slices of bread or toasted bread.

Apple sauce and nuts: Make a good rich and smooth but thick apple sauce and add to it a cup of finely chopped pecans. This is excellent with brown bread. Or the apples may be cored and sliced, then fried in butter and put on the slices hot. Then sprinkle with the nut meats and butter the top slice.

**THIS HEIFER HAS CLASS**

The Holstein heifer, Colony Favorite McKinley, owned by Colony Farm, Essondale, B. C., who has just completed a strictly official year record as a senior two-year-old of 1,569 lbs. of milk containing 1,061 pounds of butter, not only breaks the Canadian record in the two-year-old class for milk as well as butter but also breaks the world's record for strictly official butter production. This record is particularly gratifying in that the heifer carried a calf during the last 244 days of her test. Her figures for short-time work are 24.27 pounds of butter from 547.4 pounds of milk in seven days and 100.16 pounds of butter from 2,293.4 pounds of milk in 30 days. Making this record, she is placed as champion of Canada, displacing her stable companion, Colony Aggie Pieterje, who has a strictly official two-year-old record of 881.84 pounds of butter from 21,161.8 pounds of milk. —Holstein-Friesian Bulletin.

**NOTICE OF LEGISLATION.**

Public notice is hereby given that application will be made at the next session of the Legislative Assembly, by the City of Fredericton, for the passage of a bill or bills for the following purposes:

(a) To amend the City of Fredericton Assessment Act, 1907, and in particular section 46 thereof, so as to provide that tax notices may be mailed to ratepayers or delivered personally, as the City Treasurer may decide, under the direction of the Finance Committee.

(b) That the said Assessment Act be further amended so as to provide that all females assessed on income or property, real or personal, within the City of Fredericton, and who shall have paid their taxes within the time limited thereby by the said Act, shall be entitled to vote at City elections.

(c) For authority to make a grant for a Memorial in memory of soldiers who lost their lives during the Great War, either by way of assessment or by borrowing, as the City Council may decide.

(d) For authority to grant to the John Palmer Company, Limited, exemption from taxation for a period of twenty years from and including the year 1920; free sewerage for the same period of time under such limitation as the City Council may decide, and water for all purposes at the fixed rate of ten cents per thousand gallons, for the said period of twenty years.
