**YORK COUNTY COURT
TO MEET ON THE 30TH**

**James Dorcus Liberated on One
Thousand Dollars Bail—J.
Tranquilla Applies for
Naturalization.**

The York County Court His Honor Judge Wilson presiding met this morning and adjourned until March 30th when the docket will be taken up. Adjournment was necessary because the notice for the summoning of a jury had not been sufficiently long to enable the summonses to go out.

One Criminal Case

One criminal case is ready for trial The King vs James Dorcus on the information of the C. N. R. The indictment was read by H. G. Fenety clerk of the court. This case is one of the theft charges from Napudogan. The other men involved were tried before Police Magistrate Limerick and convicted. Dorcus who defended the charge was sent up for trial. He was given bail this morning on personal recognizance for \$500 and Fred Dorcus and Daniel Elliott for \$250 each. P. J. Hughes appears for the defendant.

One Civil Case

One civil case also is ready for trial by jury. It is Dora P. Hanson vs. Elizabeth Coburn.

Application for Naturalization

C. D. Richards presented the application for naturalization of John Tranquilla of Millville. The applicant is of Italian birth and nationality and is an employee of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Hearing on this application went on at three o'clock.

In Hospital at Chatham

Mr. John VanStone of this city who was seriously injured some days ago while working at the plant of Concrete Builders Limited in Devon, was taken to Chatham last evening by C. N. R. and was placed in the Hotel Dieu there. He was accompanied by Nicholas J. Ivory.

Saw Lots of Game

Mr. Charles Cremin the well known guide returned Saturday evening from a trip to the headwaters of the Tobique. He found about three and a half feet of snow in that section. Mr. Cremin, while absent, made a sixty mile trip on snow shoes. He saw during the trip fourteen deer in one herd three moose and a great number of partridge. He says that game has stood the cold weather well in the Tobique-Nepisiquit section.

Fine Band Room

The large room in the brick front of the armory, Carleton Street, which was used as a library while the Royal Canadian Regiment was stationed here, has been assigned to the 71st Regt. Band as a practise room. For years the band has occupied a room in the rear of the armory. Its members greatly appreciate the new quarters which were secured largely through the interest of Major Allan Sterling acting adjutant of the regiment.

Delegation to Ottawa

A delegation of representatives of the City Council, York Commercial Club and Board of Trade will go to Ottawa probably the latter part of next week to interview the Minister of Militia with regard to having a unit of the permanent forces of Canada stationed here. A meeting of the City Council, executive of the Board of Trade and a committee from the Commercial Club was held last night in the mayor's office. Arrangements will be made at Ottawa with regard to the date on which the delegation will be heard.

FARMERS AND DAIRYMEN HEARD INTERESTING ADDRESSES THIS MORNING ON VARIED SUBJECTS

**Provincial Horticulturist A. G. Turney Storm-Stayed and His
Assistant Had to Take His Place in Program — Formal
Opening Tonight, Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Mayor Reid and
Others Among Speakers—Good Attendance of Delegates.**

The Forty-Fourth Annual meeting of the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association of New Brunswick opened at 9.30 o'clock this morning in the Normal School Assembly Hall, the President C. F. Alward taking the chair. There was a fair attendance.

Clover and Clover Seed

O. C. Hicks instructor in Soils and Crops New Brunswick Department of Agriculture was the first speaker of the morning. He dealt at length upon the clover seed industry of the province and Dominion. In 1919 there were 3,000,000 lbs of clover seed imported, in 1916 4,800,000 lbs and in 1918 2,500,000 lbs. In the same years 129,000, 67,000 and 48,000 lbs. were exported. In speaking of the clover hay industry in Canada Mr. Hicks gave figures to indicate the large number of tons of clover hay sold during the war. The United States bought over 160,000 tons and France and England over 400,000 tons. All of this was pressed at the central pressing plant at Montreal. In the province of New Brunswick over 1,200,000 tons of hay were raised in the last year.

Beekeeping

The next speaker was L. T. Floyd who gave a very good lecture on the bee industry of the province. Of the 105 keepers who reported to the government a general average of 436 lbs per bee-keeper was realized, in all 45,780 lbs of bees' honey. There are at the present time 603 farmers in New Brunswick in the bee industry and one woman in the industry has established a record for the province getting 17,905 lbs of honey from 12 hives.

Horticulture

On account of Mr. A. G. Turney Provincial Horticulturist being snow-bound in the country, Mr. Danby his assistant, was called upon to give a talk regarding Horticulture. Mr. Danby gave a very interesting talk on the subject but owing to the very short notice which he had he was unable to present any figures in regards to the apple growing industry in New Brunswick. On finishing his talk many

questions were asked him by men interested in the apple industry in this province which he answered ably and well.

Poultry Raising

A. C. McCulloch Poultry Superintendent New Brunswick Department of Agriculture, gave an interesting talk on the poultry raising industry of the province giving reasons as to why the Barred Plymouth Rock bird is being made a specialty by the government poultry division in its bird raising. He told of the forming of the poultry clubs throughout the province and the work they were doing toward extending this particular strain of bird. The meeting on the finish of Mr. McCulloch's address then adjourned. It met at 1.45 o'clock this afternoon when the Dairying and Cooperative Creameries were discussed by A. E. Trites President of the Farmers Cooperative Creamery and H. W. Coleman Dairy Superintendent, New Brunswick Department of Agriculture.

At 3.30 o'clock Jas. Bremner Jr. Agricultural Representative N. B. D. A. gave a long talk on "Bulls, their Care and Keep". He was succeeded by J. A. Ste. Marie who gave an address on the same subject in French to the French representatives at the meeting.

Witness at Toronto

Mr. Claire Downey shipping clerk for the Canadian Cottons Limited at the Marysville mill, will leave for Toronto tonight in company with a detective from that place who is obtaining witnesses in a theft case which will be heard in that city. The theft was of an entire bale of cotton manufactured at the Marysville mill for a prominent mail order house with headquarters in Toronto. Mr. Downey as shipping clerk will be required to identify the stolen goods.

J. A. Ste. Marie of Ottawa, Assistant Animal Husbandman is here in connection with the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association of N. B. He is a guest at the Barker House.

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
