LOAN FUND FOR NORMAL STUDENTS

At Thursday's session of the conference of school inspectors of the province with Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education and Principal Bridges, of the Provincial Normal School, held at St. John many matters of importance were taken up and discussed.

It was agreed by all that the present compulsory school act was unsatisfactory and the only remedy proposed was enforcement by provincial authorities.

It was the consensus of opinion that the standard of entrance to Normal School and University should not be reduced at present owing to the scarcity of teachers.

In discussing the ways and means of increasing the number of candidates for teachers' licenses, it was thought that if the candidates were acquainted with some means of borrowing money to pay their way through the Normal School, the profession might be more attractive. It was suggested that the government might establish a loan fund for this purpose.

It was decided that each inspector should take care to explain to each prospective candidate the improved conditions, particularly in the surroundings of the profession, which might attract those who might not otherwise consider studying for the profession.

Dr. Carter said after the meeting that it should be recognized by the public that any increase in salaries for teachers, however great, cannot have an immediate effect on the supply of teachers, as it will take some time for them to prepare for the work, and the present scarcity is to be expected for two or three years at least.

Boston, Aug. 28.—The receiver in bankruptcy of Charles Ponzi who skyrocketed into fame as an alleged maker of millions in international postal reply coupons, formally seized Ponzi's expensive home in Lexington, and the several automobiles which he bought in his days of affluence.

The wife and mother of the imprisoned promoter were allowed to continue their residence there and it is understood they will not be disturbed until the estate is settled.

PULP AND PAPER EXPORTS HAVE INCREASED

Montreal, Aug. 27.—While somewhat belated, the returns from the Dominion government of pulp and paper exports for April, the first month of the new fiscal year, show an increase of nearly 65 per cent over those of one year ago. The total for the month was \$8,172,356 as compared with \$4,968,939, a gain of \$3,203,417. The largest increases were in pulp, both sulphite and ground wood, that is, chemical and mechanical, which were more than double.

In the case of news print there was a slight falling off in quantity temporarily, although the heavy increase in price brought the valuation far above last year's. The amount exported was \$99,342 cwt. as compared with \$20,592 in April, 1919. The value compared, however, as \$3,827,541 to

\$3,160,318 in 1919. There was a decrease in the export of pulp wood, much along the line of the past year's experience, more and more of Canada's pulpwood remaining in this country to be manufactured into pulp or paper.

The pulp wood exports for the month amounted to 40,433 cords compared with 68,689 cords, or a value of \$420,741 compared with \$629,189 one year ago.

The largest increase of all was in unbleached sulphite pulp, of which there were exported 397,359 cwt., as against 87,786 one year ago, or a valuation of \$1,587,236 against \$352,485, or over four times. In bleached sulphite 131,161 cwt. were exported, valued at \$728,699, compared with 80,259 cwt. valued at \$363,732 one year ago. Exports of sulphate pulp amounted to 163,533 cwt. of a value of \$620,728, as compared with 131,375 cwt. valued at \$404,773 one year ago. Mechanical pulp was exported to the amount of 198,664 cwt. valued at \$506,369, against 161,499 cwt. of a value of \$217,711 in April, 1919.

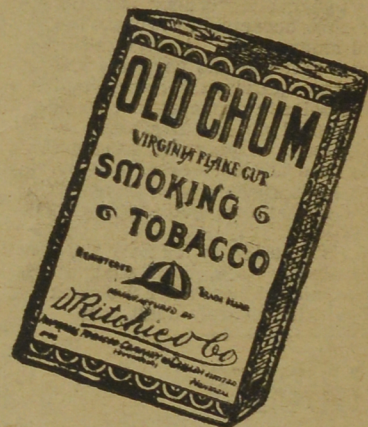

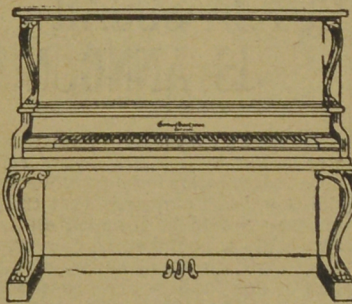
