It was agreed by all that the present compulsory school act was unsatis-actory and the only remedy proposed vas enforcement by provincial authori-

It was the concensus of opinion that the standard of entrance to Normal School and University should not be reduced at present owing to the scar-city of teachers.

In discussing the ways and means of increasing the number of candidates for teachers' licenses, it was thought that if the candidates were acquainted with some means of borrowing money o pay their way through the Normal School, the profession might be more attractive. It was suggested that the government might esablish a loan fund for his purpose. It was decided that each inspector

It was decided that each inspects should take care to explain to each prospective candidate the improved conditions, particularly in the surgendings of the profession, which roundings of the profession, which otherwise consider studying for the

Dr. Carter said after the meeting that it should be recognized by the public that any increase in salaries for teachers, however great, cannot have an immediate effect on the supply of teachers, as it will take some time for them to make the salaries. for them to prepare for the work, and the present scarcity is to be expected for two or three years at least

PULP AND PAPER **EXPORTS HAVE**

Montreal, Aug. 27.—While somewhat belated, the returns from the Domin-

in price brought the valuation far above last year's. The amount exported was 899,342 cwt as compared with 920,592 in April, 1919. The value ompared, however, as \$3,827,541 to love an audacious one.

\$3,160,318 in 1919. There was a decrease in the export of pulp wood, much aong the line of the past year's experience, more and more of Canada's pulpwood remaining in this country to be manufactured into pulp or paper.

The pulp wood exports for the month amounted to 40,433 cords comared with 68,680 cords, or a value of \$420,741 compared with \$629,189 one year ago.

The largest increase of all was in Montreal, Aug. 21. White someward belated, the returns from the Dominion government of pulp and paper exports for April, the first month of the new fiscall year, show an increase of nearly 65 per cent over those of one year ago. The total for the month was \$8,172,356 as compared with \$4,968,939, a gain of \$3,203,417. The largest increases were in pulp, both sulphite and ground wood, that is, chemical and mechanical, which were more than double.
