MANY BRIDES READY FOR CANADIAN BOYS

Six Who Advertised Recently for Life Partners Were Deluged
With Applications—British Columbia Men Are After Girls
of the Farmerette Type—Some Samples of the Replies
Which Were Received.

London, Feb. 10—Hundreds of letters have been received from "Lloyd's News" readers in reply to the request of six Canadian soldiers for the addresses of English girls, preferably "farmerettes," with whom they may correspond, "with a view to matrimony." A big parcel of correspondence is now on its way from "Lloyd's News" to the six Canadians.

Some girls sent their photographs; almost every writer describes her personal appearance; but the practical side has not been overlooked and efficiency in farm, garden, and housework is again and again emphasized.

"Three Who Love a Joke"

Sometimes the sentimental note is entirely absent. Three sisters write: "We should like to exchange photographs with Ronald McDonald, Jack O'Connor and John Border. Should they be already on order we don't mind trying the other three blighters. We range in ages twenty-four, twenty, and eighteen. Should we come to terms we hope to be allowed to take our tender parents with us, also a dog, two birds, and a rabbit with three and a half legs (the other half remains in the rat trap). Yours truly, Three Who Enjoy a Joke."

Quite sporting also is the type-written letter of a London girl:

SUCKER LIST WAS BROKER'S ONLY ASSET

New York, Feb. 10—As Laurason R. Latrobe left the bankruptcy court yesterday after freely admitting he could not account for the three-quarters of a million dollars sent him in purchase of stocks by 10,000 or more clients throughout the country he was arrested by a post office inspector, arraigned before United States Commissioner Hitchcock and held in \$25,000 bail charged with using the mails to defraud.

Latrobe's only apparent assets, known in Wall Street's pet language as a "sucker list," was advertised a few days ago as the only residue from the fortune that came to him and went from him. He said yesterday, his bank account showed a balance of \$15. He owns no stocks or bonds. While he and a partner he said was named Jacqueline conducted the brokerage firm of L. R. Latrobe & Co. at 111 Broadway every mail brought in new sums from those who yielded to the attraction of his advertisements for an instalment plan stock purchase, he testified.

The money accumulated so fast it was dealt with in a lump sum. No separate accounts were kept in banks. In fact Latrobe confessed readily that he could not remember mere details. He did recall that he gave his wife \$10,000 a year for the last five years, he said, but otherwise the money sent him by those whose names form the comic and tragic "sucker list" might as well have evaporated. Latrobe estimated his liabilities at \$210,000, rather than the \$750,000 named by counsel for creditors.

It was just after another bankruptcy hearing had been set for February 16 that Latrobe, leaving Acting Commissioner William Tallman's office, encountered the post office inspector. His appearance in the bankruptcy proceedings yesterday followed the issue of a body attachment procured by the creditors.

It is said that the Dutch government is considering the advisability of banishing the ex-Kaiser to Sumatra Island, in the East Indies. He will be escorted there by warships of the Allies and the banishment will be for life.
