LONDON MOVIE SHOWS ARE GIVING VICIOUS EXHIBITIONS

Some Particulars of the Latest Scandal in the British Metropolis—Movies Have Been Installed in Private Houses—Prices of Admission Vary and Patrons are Selected With the Greatest Care—Authorities are Active.

London, Feb. 11.—Secret "movie" shows in private houses is one of the worst and the latest of scandals with which Scotland Yard detectives are grappling in this city.

These "shows" are beginning to spring up in all parts of London, particularly in Soho, the great foreign quarter of the metropolis, and in Bloomsbury, a closely inhabited residential quarter of the metropolis, and in a population, with remarkable speed, which is a sure indication that the promoters are finding the idea a paying one.

They are to be found in certain private houses and the films exhibited are those which the British board of film censors never have, nor will have the opportunity of inspecting. They would not dare be shown in any public cinema in this or any other country.

The secret movie show, in more senses than one, is a result of Scotland Yard's recent determined campaign to close undesirable establishments in the West End of London.

The effect of this has been that the army of crooks who flocked here directly after the armistice was signed from New York and the continent have had to puzzle their brains to find new "stunts."

A vigorous war has been waged on shady night clubs, disreputable dancing halls and gambling houses, and now the Yard is watching with a keen eye the development of secret cinema shows.

The individuals responsible for the introduction of these vicious concerns are foreigners. The films they exhibit are smuggled from abroad—principally from France and the Argentine—and having been shown in one house are immediately passed on to another for these cinemas have their regular patrons necessitating a frequent and complete change of programme.

SCENE AT A FASHIONABLE WEDDING FETE

London Feb. 11.—A group of social leaders gathered for a fashionable wedding at Brompton Oratory the other day witnessed a curious scene immediately after the ceremony when two well-dressed women barred the exit of the bridegroom and demanded to know what he had done with their boy. The women were the Marchesa Dusmet de Smours and her daughter and the bridegroom they accosted was Dudley Kingston Petano-Heathcote, cousin of the Earl of Lancaster and son of the late Gorgonio Petano Mazariagos, formerly of the Spanish diplomatic service. The boy in question was Mr. Heathcote's son, a child of eight, and the women who demanded him were his maternal grandmother and aunt.

The demand at such a time and place proved a disturbing incident to a wedding party composed of Countess Countess de la Warr, who had given the bride away; Lady Margaret Sackville, the Countess's daughter, and Miss Lilla Dunbar, the bride's sister, who had acted as maids of honor; the Earl of Ancaster, Muriel Lady Helmsley, Sir Robert and Lady Morant, Lady Lavery, Lady Dorothy Mills, Count and Countess de la Chapelle and Admiral and Mrs. da Costa. A police officer stopped the scene almost at the beginning, enabling the married pair to get away without a word to the astounded wedding party.

Heathcote afterward explained the circumstances to newspaper inquirers. He said that in 1910 he had been married to Ida, daughter of Frederick Hugo Matheze and of Marchesa Maria Tiedman Dusmet de Smours. The wife died last February. On May 24 he and Miss Jessie Elizabeth Dunbar of No. 3 Kensington Crescent were married at the office of a Registrar. They made this civil contract because he was a Catholic and the bride a Protestant.

NO CHANGE IN QUEBEC LAW
