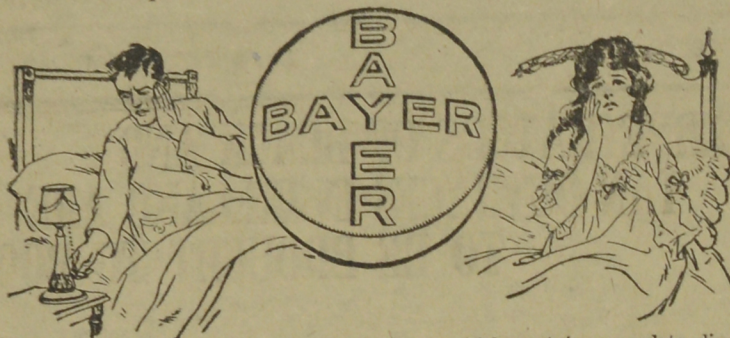


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HOCKEY RUMORS ARE PLENTIFUL AT MONCTON—SUSSEX RUMORED TO BE WILLING TO JOIN N. B. H. L.

Moncton Reporte d to Have Two Teams—The Eatonians Possible as a Second Team in That City — Amateur Hockey on the Cards — Grant of Halifax to be With Arenas, Already Organized—No Chance for the Island.

(Moncton Transcript.)

It was stated Wednesday evening that Moncton would go in for amateur hockey this winter, as it did in the winter of 1919-20.

Already a team has been organized here known as the "Arenas" composed of several members of the 1919-20 Victorias, and several others, who are wizards on the steel.

In all probability the fans will observe the Carroll brothers in the game this winter along with several other players who have recently taken up residence in this city, as well as others who will reach the city to reside in Moncton in the future.

It is felt that a second team should be at once organized so that Moncton will have two representative teams this winter instead of one, as was the vogue last season.

Speaking about the second team it might be possible that the "Eatonians" could place a team in the league, thus making up the second team for the city, as it is felt the big mail order house harbors several Upped Canada steel wizards who would bring glory to Moncton as well as to the big mail order house.

New Player.

Grant, a former Crescent man of Halifax, will be lined up with the "Arenas" this season, so that with the Carroll brothers and Grant the Arenas aggregation should be materially strengthened this season. It is hoped to have Jack Ingram in the game again and his decision to line up with the Arenas is awaited. At any rate the local fans are assured of at least one team representing Moncton in the proposed league games this year. However it must not be overlooked that to date the season is early and the proposals are but tentative. It is expected to have the "Arenas" into practice at an early date when physical drill will be featured.

A meeting is to be held in the immediate future relative to the hockey situation in Moncton this season and all fans should attend this meeting, due notice of which will be given.

Proposed League.

At present it is being proposed to organize a league having Sackville, Moncton (two teams), Amherst, and presumably Springhill, although it is doubted here whether Springhill will "wing on" with the New Brunswick teams.

At a former time it was proposed to have Charlottetown, Moncton, Amherst and Sackville as a league, but the Island jump inconvenienced all teams so other arrangements are being sought.

Sussex, which was in the Eastern league last year may not be in the league this season but may shift in the league with Marysville, Fredericton and St. John city—if St. John places a team in a league.

It is said the Amherst Ramblers team may lose Bill Stewart this season as Dal University has handed out some nice inducements to him, says rumor, which tidings does not emanate from Halifax, and is therefore taken with more weight by the fans.

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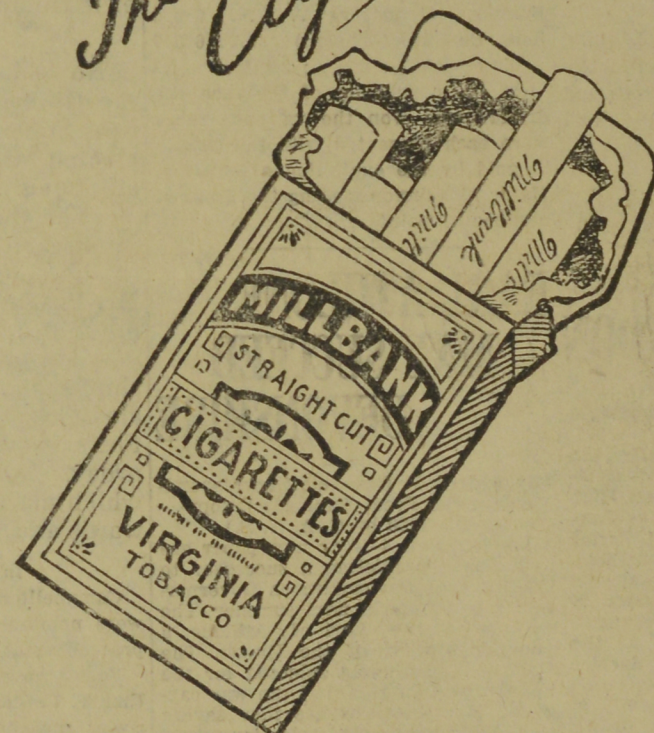
