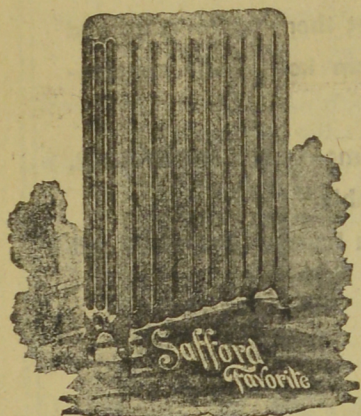

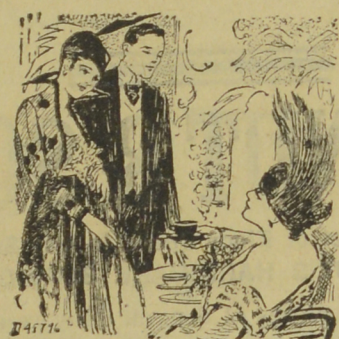

HOW ROAD WORK WAS DONE UNDER THE OLD GOVERNMENT

Conditions Were So Bad That Even Mr. Pinder was Forced to Put Up a Kick in the ouse—Scored the Old Government for Not Carrying Out Its Pre-election Promises—His Complaint Like All Others, Had No Effect.

The charge has been frequently made in this campaign by government speakers and newspapers that the old government was not only corrupt but that it was grossly incompetent as well. The road and bridge work throughout the province was done in a perfunctory manner and there was waste and extravagance on every side. If proof of this is wanted it is only necessary to quote from remarks made in the House during the session of 1915 by one J. K. Pinder, who is supposed to be a close connection with one of the opposition candidates now running in Yrk. Here is his speech in part as taken from the official debates:

Mr. Pinder's Complaint

"Mr. Pinder said before the Bill was taken into consideration he wished to protest most strongly against the manner in which the road law was administered. All the power to do every thing regarding the roads seemed to be placed in the hands of the Minister of Public Works. When the Hazen Government came into power in 1908, they promised that the people should have the control of the roads placed in their own hands, and that promise had never been properly carried out. Anyone who travelled about York County could see that there had been no such improvement in the condition of the roads as there should have been had they been under proper management. There appeared to be a different system in operation in that county. The Board of Works had its headquarters there and with all arrangements left in the hands of some of the officials it was impossible to get fair treatment from the department. Crossing the river they came to a separate road district, where they had their own legislation, which enabled them to collect their rates themselves and spend them as they liked on their own roads. Going further up river as far as Marysville, there they too handled their own roads and kept them in first class condition. Coming back to this side of the river again, where the roads were in the hands of Government officials, they were nothing but a disgrace. Unless some better method could be adopted to deal with the roads there could be nothing else but failure.

A Concrete Case

Coming back to the management of into the department. He did so, and missioner having charge of the roads in the district where he (Pinder) lived was allotted \$25 which was utterly inadequate for the purpose of keeping the roads in order, but the commissioner spent the money as well as he could and did as much work as the money would allow. Then there came a storm and a hill was washed out. The commissioner came to him to know what he should do, and he (Pinder) told him to go on and make the best job he could, spending as little as possible. The cost of repairing the damage was about \$22, and he told the commissioner to send the bill into the department. He did so, and the bill was returned with the remark that the commissioner had spent all his money could get no more assistance. Shortly afterwards, however the department appointed a special commissioner for that district and allowed him \$50 to spend. The minister could give this man \$50 to spend but he had no money to pay the \$22 the other commissioner had expended on work that was necessary. With such management as that no one could expect that the roads would be kept as they should be.

Has No Effect

Mr. Pinder's complaint does not appear to have borne fruit for he came back to the subject during the session of 1916 as follows:

Mr. Pinder said he had a few remarks to make. It would be remembered that last session when the Public Works estimates were before the committee he took occasion to complain about the large amount of work that appeared to be done by day labor and it seemed to him that no improvement in affairs had taken place in that

time. Not only ordinary bridges but permanent bridges also which would be new work seemed to be done by the day. In the years 1914 and 1915 in Northumberland County alone no less than \$42,434 was spent in day work for repairs to old bridges and on new ones.

When the present government came into office in 1908 one of the principle planks in their platform was that all public works would be put up by tender and this rule should have been carried out. * * * No better example could be furnished than the recent repairs to the Fredericton highway bridge where \$64,000 was spent in repairing one pier. A large part of that money could have been saved if the work could have been let by tender.

Then there was the work which had been done during the last few months in the way of painting and repairs, and also at the gate house at Old Government House. White lead was charged for at the rate of \$13.50, whereas \$10.50 was the quotation which he had been given as the real market price. The same was true of oil and other materials. The men were all charged at \$3 per day, whereas some of the men told him that they were paid \$2.25 while others said they were paid \$2.50, and the latter was the highest wages he had been able to find had been paid. There was another rake-off and that was what it was all through the department.

Money Wasted

Then there had been quantities of gravel hauled in the winter to places along the road and then hauled again in the spring. This might be what the department called, economy, but it seemed to him to be the most extravagant proposition the country had ever been up against. The supervisors were apparently instructed to haul gravel in the winter time, and they kept on hauling until they used up all available funds.

Unless the electors of York want to see a return of the conditions about which Mr. Pinder complained they should vote for the government candidates, IcksDon, Watson, Coburn and Christie.

THE SECRET OF PERPETUAL YOUTH SOLVED

Berlin Sept. 28—Herr Eugen Steinach, Professor of Biology in Vienna University, whose remarkable claim to the discovery of the secret of youth has been announced, has published here a brochure explaining his theory and the results of his investigations. As long ago as December, 1912, the professor assured the academicians of Vienna that the treatment of a certain gland afforded the possibility of retarding the advance of old age. From this he developed the idea of rejuvenation, and began experiments.

The most interesting of the first series was an old man of seventy-one, who gives the following account reproduced in Steinach's book: "Soon after the operation, my appetite began to increase to such a degree that I could hardly satisfy it. While before the operation, I was plunged in mental depression, now a few months afterward again I feel the joy of life. My appearance is again fresh, and, for my age, I am exceptionally supple. People meeting me for the first time take me to be about sixty, and refuse to believe I am really seventy-one. Formerly, when I walked quickly or ascended an incline, I suffered from giddiness and loss of breath. Now, these symptoms have almost completely disappeared, and very frequently I take walks of several hours' duration. In short, I do not in the least feel like a man who has entered the period of old age. It strikes me as one sign of increased vigor that I have to visit the barber every week and have my hair and beard cut. My hands, which formerly trembled, are now quite steady, and able to perform the most delicate manipulations."

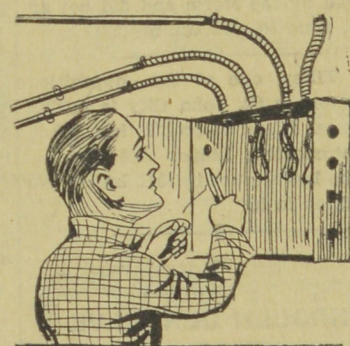
