It is believed that Gloucester will give a larger majority than ever to the government. Hon. Mr. Veniot leaves tonight for Kent County.

Madawaska

Edmundston, Oct. 2—The official nomination of candidates for Madawaska for the provincial general election took place very quietly today, the government candidates, J. E. Michaud and D. L. Daigle being elected by acclamation. The official nomination papers were signed by Pius Michaud, M. P., Hon. L. A. Dugal, John F. Stevens, A. Lawson, Joseph Michaud, J. W. Hall, Dr. Laporte, Dr. Simard and others. After the nomination proceedings were closed, speeches were made by the candidates and also by Pius Michaud and Hon. L. A. Dugal.

Charlotte

St. Stephen, Oct. 2—Nomination day passed off quietly in St. Andrews today, although a large number were present, arriving by train, boat and automobile. The nominations were: For government, Harry W. Mann, St. Stephen; John W. Scovil, St. Stephen; Hugh R. Lawrence, St. George, and Frank Kennedy, St. Andrews; for the opposition, John M. Flewelling, St. Stephen and Dr. H. I. Taylor, St. George; farmers' candidates, Scott D. Guptill, Grand Manan, and Chauncey Pollard, Tower Hill. Speeches were made by the candidates, with the exception of Mr. Kennedy, who was confined to his home by illness. George M. Byron spoke for him. Mrs. E. Atherton Smith of St. John, also spoke in the interests of the government.

Carleton

Woodstock, Oct. 2—Seven candidates for the three Carleton county seats were nominated today. Hon. B. Frank Smith independent; Rennie Tracey, Samuel Burlock and Fred Smith for the United Farmers, and Robert L. Simms of Woodstock and Dr. M. E. Commins of Bath, government, and S. G. Barter, running as a returned soldier.

Proceedings in Queens.

Gagetown, N. B., Oct. 2—A most enthusiastic reception was given to the government candidates, Hon. Dr. J. E. Hetherington and G. H. King, at the nomination day meeting in the court house here on Saturday afternoon. Though speeches were also delivered by the opposition candidates, Alfred West and W. A. Machum, and by the Farmers candidates, George W. Hughes and George W. Dingee the sympathy and interest of the largely attended meeting seemed to be almost entirely with the government candidates. J. F. Reid presided over a large attendance, the court house being crowded to capacity. There were many women present at the meeting and their frequent applause showed that they fully understood the salient features of the present provincial campaign.

Dr. Hetherington, who was the first speaker, spoke of the work that had been done on the roads of Queen's county by the present government and also the incalculable good that had been accomplished by the provincial public health department. He defended the provincial intoxicating liquor act and said that he had the honor of being one of those who voted for it in the house. Answering a statement that had been made at another time to the effect that the good roads of the province were mainly for the benefit of motorists, Dr. Hetherington reminded the audience that all motorists paid a heavy tax to the provincial government for the privilege of using the roads and that the highways were free to everyone, irrespective of class.

Alfred West, the opposition candidate, had not the clear and concise style of expression used by Dr. Hetherington and his reception was not so

good as the opposition had been hoping for. He said that this was the first provincial election in which the farmers, as a party, had made a large entry of candidates in the field and he did not entirely approve of the Farmer party.

Charles W. Dingee, Farmer candidate, regretted that the Farmer party had not been organized long ago, as the farmers were past masters in economy and their services would be most useful in the legislature. He advocated support of the prohibition act and for the conduct of a clean election.

Mr. Dingee said that he had helped in the election of Hon. J. K. Flemming but he was glad now that he had since changed his mind, "like many others."

Mr. G. H. King, who was given a fine reception, ably reviewed the splendid record of the Foster Government and urged the electors to support himself and Dr. Hetherington.

WILL WORK NINE HOURS

Paris, Oct. 4—Eight hundred thousand workers of the building trades department of Pas de Calais, Nord, have voted to work nine hours daily instead of eight as prescribed by the labor federation, during eight months of the year, and eight hours daily during the four winter months, the workers have repudiated every radical suggestion made by the Labor federation which is incompatible with a rapid restoration of the devastated regions or contrary to the best interests of French labor.

He made an error confusing St. Mary's Ferry, now North Devon, with his destination. He left this morning for St. Mary's, Kent County.
